

Marketing savvy

The best laid plans can build your patient base

Word-of-mouth may be the most effective and least expensive way to find new patients, but it's not the only tool at your disposal. Many inexpensive strategies exist for you to put in place, and will leave a good impression on your patients. The important thing to remember is to be proactive about marketing your practice. Take the time to learn what your patients want and develop a strategy to meet those needs. While some ideas are listed below, be creative and have fun doing it.

Make a plan

You wouldn't start work on a patient without mapping out a course for treatment, so don't just try out new strategies as you think of them—devise your marketing plan beforehand.

Before you start an external marketing campaign or spend money on advertisements, start with your internal marketing strategies, says Stephen J. Persichetti, DDS, FAGD, Portland, Ore. These include answering telephones politely, being punctual for your patients, providing easy-to-read bills and statements, and providing proper follow-up care. "If you make your patients happy, they will talk about you to their friends," Dr. Persichetti says.

Staff chemistry can make or break you. If the staff works together well and enjoys each other's company, patients will be put at ease. Patients can sense when there is unrest in the office, and they won't want to return to a hostile environment.

Marketing for Success If a patient is happy with the service he or she has received and says so, ask them to refer new patients to your practice. "If you like having a certain patient in your practice, tell them, and ask if they have any friends they might like to refer," Dr. Persichetti says.

When implementing marketing strategies, it is important to evaluate whether they are successful. One way to do this is investing in practice-management software. Melvin Pierson, DDS, opened his Sicklerville, N.J., practice in the fall of 1999, with no patients; he now has more than 5,000. He says dental software allows him to track how patients find his office (word-of-mouth, a telephone directory, print advertisements, etc.)

The software evaluates which marketing tools (direct mailers, newspaper ads, etc.) yield the greatest returns, helping you determine your best marketing source. Less expensive programs, like Microsoft Office, which includes Excel, will allow you to create spreadsheets that track referrals and marketing plans.

Be creative

Your marketing strategy can be as unique as your office—don't be afraid to try something a little different. One effective marketing tool Dr. Pierson uses is something he calls PiersonBucks, generic-looking signed checks worth \$50. This can be used toward paying off a bill or receiving a free whitening. If one of Dr. Pierson's patients refers a new patient who makes an appointment, the referring patient receives a PiersonBuck. "It's very effective and easy to explain," Dr. Pierson says.

receives a PiersonBuck. It's very effective and easy to explain," Dr. Pierson says. PiersonBucks even have several spin-offs, including gift certificates to local restaurants or movie passes. "We tell them, refer six patients and get a free whitening treatment." With so many elective and cosmetic procedures not covered by insurance, Dr. Pierson says the PiersonBucks have been very successful in bringing—and keeping—new patients into the office.

Know your community

Be aware of your patients' general income level and demographics and tailor your marketing plan to fit their needs. If you practice in a working-class community, your patients may be less interested in cosmetic dentistry and full-mouth reconstruction than in a more affluent neighborhood.

If you have a large non-English-speaking patient base, you may want to hire multilingual staff members. Patients will feel more comfortable talking about dental and health issues in their native language, according to Neil J. Gajjar, DDS, who practices in Mississauga, Ont., Canada. Dr. Gajjar's staff speaks five different languages. "Speaking the same language as the patient automatically makes them feel more at home," Dr. Gajjar says. "We notice that patients book appointments when that particular staff member is working."

If you have a large number of patients of a certain religion or ethnic group, you might wish to tailor your office design to those principles, such as Feng Shui or Vastu Shastra, to make those individuals feel more comfortable in your office.

Getting involved in your community is another way to spread your name around. Sponsor local youth sports teams, perform community service, or offer free screenings for local charity groups. "People like to see their dentist at functions and events," Dr. Gajjar says. "Plus, it will remind them that they need to visit you." Offer your time and service at school health fairs or sports screenings, and turn kids into mini-marketers by sending them home with magnets, toothbrushes or business cards. Dr. Pierson says, "It's more worthwhile to give up an hour of your time doing that than to run an ad that costs two or three times [your hourly earnings] and might not get you any patients."

Practice Issues

Put your plan in place

Marketing dos and don'ts for your office

Keep it simple. If you can't explain your referral program in a few sentences, then it's too confusing for patients to remember.

Beware bargain hunters. Complimentary cleanings or whitening treatments may get patients in the door, but many will just be looking for the best deal or to spread their dental bill around several offices. They won't be the long-term patients you want to attract.

Don't promise more than you can deliver. Patients may come to expect free gifts all the time if you shower them with specials and freebies. It's the service and care you give that should keep them in your practice.

Ask for help if you need it. If you don't feel comfortable coming up with a marketing plan on your own, enlist the help of a marketing or practice management consultant to generate ideas and action. But be careful to make sure that the plans they devise fit your needs and goals for your practice.

Get personal

Make your patients feel that you care about them personally. They will remember acts of kindness before all the freebies. Sending birthday cards and remembering important events will make patients feel that you're individually invested in them. "Patients will


remember that personal touch," Dr. Pierson says.

And while you keep tabs on your patients, you should keep them up to date about you and your practice. Through a newsletter, tell patients about new skills or new technology or employees you hire-anything about the practice.

Offer conveniences

Your patients are busy, just like you, and they may not come back if you waste their time. But patients will remember when you made their lives easier. In addition to installing radios or televisions in each operatory, consider adding wireless Internet access in the waiting room and operatories, allowing patients to surf the internet. Remind your patients about their appointments through e-mail, so they can easily enter those dates into a personal data assistant (Palm Pilot).

Allow your patients and potential patients to find more about you by creating a Web site. Potential patients who are looking for a dentist will find you through search engines, says Dr. Gajjar. If you create a Web site, make sure it has an easy address to remember (like www.driones.com) and that it will be picked up by major search engines like Google and Yahoo. And if you don't feel comfortable designing a Web site yourself, contact a local Web developer. The AGD has developed "Member Web pages" which allows you to create one page of information about you and your practice. It can be customized and then set up to link to your site. Go to www.agd.org/ members.only/agdBuilder/start.html.

Beyond the Yellow Pages

A large ad in the Yellow Pages is an expensive route to take and typically doesn't yield as much of a return as other forms of advertising. If you must, Dr. Persichetti suggests making the ad no larger than a business card.

Other print ads may be even more effective. A recurring ad in the local newspaper keeps your name at potential patients' fingertips every time they read the news. They may forget radio or TV ads, but they will look through a newspaper or magazine when searching for a dentist. Dr. Pierson writes informative articles about periodontal disease and other dental problems in the local newspaper. Dr. Gajjar has been successful in advertising in bridal magazines. "So many men and women have come to us for whitening prior to their wedding," he says.

No matter how you choose to market your practice, be sure to create a plan that suits your own personality and attitude. Set yourself apart from the rest of crowd, but don't compromise care, integrity or your practice's identity.

As spectators were emptying the downtown Vancouver courtroom, Ellard's mother, Susan Pakos, told Virk's mother, Suman, she was sorry the process would continue.

Moments later, Tarsem Pallan, Virk's grandmother, hugged Pakos and her husband.

"I'm exhausted. Just exhausted," George Pakos, Ellard's stepfather told reporters. Ellard's lawyer, Robert Claus,

said his client was "disappointed that it's not an acquittal. "She wishes it was over and it's

not," said Claus, adding he hopes there's not a third trial.

"It's been as good a case as they could put together," Claus said of the crown. "I don't think it gets any better for them than it was this time.

"It (a third trial) would be extraordinarily difficult for everyone."



Know the power of the internet. Web-sites like intersearchable web lists of employers with unsettled pay claims, legal and employment resources, contract young lawyers/interns to settle claims quickly, publish articles in ethnic/community newspapers advising on immigrant rights.

Choice of Treatment

In the President's Column in the March ICDA,1 Dr. Dubé writes that after the dentist has given a patient the required explanations for treatment, "the patient is the one who decides which treatment is best suited for him or her." Does a patient visiting an office which advertises itself as mercury-free have this choice? Parents frequently bring their children to my office because another dentist told them treatment would need to be done under general anesthesia. They were not given the option of premedication or patient restraint. Often patient management wasn't even attempted. In 90% of the cases I have treated, the patients happily received dental treatment without general anesthesia. Too often our practises are influenced by the media, new technology, our personal philosophy, competition between professionals, and the need to meet our bottom line.

I remember a dentist who offered his patients the choice between the Volkswagon, the Chevrolet or the Cadillac treatment. He discussed the pros and cons of each treatment plan and then allowed the patients to make their choice. As you state "our role no longer involves determining the need of patients, but establishing options that meet their expectations." The operative word here is *their*.

Passport for Low-Fee or Free Services

Agencies and organizations that target services (e.g., housing, food bank, athletic programs, library, transit) to people in financial need often use an eligibility test to determine if the applicants fit their criteria. In Calgary, a group of agencies offering low-fee or free services is examining the idea of using a common eligibility test and developing a common 'passport' for clients.

There are some obvious advantages. Clients would undergo the test only once to get a passport that would give them access to a host of services. By the same token, each agency could increase service delivery by reducing resources spent reviewing eligibility.

However, the challenges are significant. Agencies offering high-value services require a more extensive eligibility check (i.e., more intrusion into financial affairs). In addition, some issues are important to individual agencies, but unimportant to others (e.g., we exclude families with dental insurance).

As we struggle with this idea, I wonder if other communities have investigated or implemented anything like this 'passport' concept? Surely this issue is not unique to Calgary. I'm very interested in the experiences of others, in the hope that they may help us.


Mastertrack – Anterior and Posterior Aesthetics November 2004

The Ontario Academy of General Dentistry held its Mastertrack module on Anterior and Posterior Aesthetics in Niagara Falls. The course, held at the Renaissance Fallsview, commenced on Thursday, November 4 and ended on Sunday, November 7th. The three day participation course was attended by 14 dentists from as far as Nova Scotia and Manitoba in Canada and Orchard Park in the United States.

The Mastertrack is a series of participation modules on specific disciplines of dentistry designed to train dentists on advanced dental procedures and help get Fellows of the Academy their Mastership.

The first day of the module consisted of case presentations by participants of the previous module on oral surgery. Twelve participants presented cases ranging from extraction of 8's to removal and biopsy of soft tissue pathology. On Friday, Dr. Don Collins, DDS, MAGD lectured on Posterior Aesthetic dentistry with CEREC. In the afternoon, the participants went to Dr. Mancuso's office to prep, design, and mill restorations using the CEREC -3D. Trustees. The initial findings will be compiled into guiding principles that follow the mission of the organization.

While we still have more data to come in January 2005, this was a terrific inauguration. This market data allows the AGD to reenergize for tomorrow's challenges and opportunities. The results confirmed that what we believe the AGD needs to accomplish is in tune with what our members and nonmembers are trying to tell us.

Principles of Leadership

Recognizing these critical needs the Board of Trustees unanimously voted to embrace the following eleven (11) "Principles of Leadership" decision making (or governance principles):

- 1. Trusteeship_Sitting in trust for others is the role of the board. The board is accountable to those who could be corporate owners, the community as owners, or members of an association;
- 2. Authority resides in the group, not individuals;
- 3. A board decision is speaking with ONE voice;
- 4. Speak positively about the strategic outcomes; stay out of strategies EXCEPT to restrict or set boundaries for what is acceptable in activities or circumstances. Limitations are stated in the negative;
- 5. Decide the most general issues in each area before deciding more specific issues in any area. In creating restraints, the board is more and more specific when it wants to constrain the choices of the Executive Director and President;
- 6. Stop at the level where you can accept any reasonable interpretation of the policy just created;
- 7. Where the board stops speaking on outcomes and strategies, the Executive Director is empowered to make all further decisions; or Where the board stops speaking on board process and relationships, the President is empowered to make all further decisions;
- 8. Only monitor against criteria already set;
- 9. A board's major work is with outcomes determination, prioritization and linking with the ownership;
- 10. The board's job description is its perpetual agenda. From this an annual agenda developed which, in turn, becomes the stimulus for individual meeting agendas;
- 11. The board develops a plan for accomplishing its own work.

This Strategic Futures Initiative will culminate in a spring 2005 (April 14-16) Strategic Futures Conference of all AGD stakeholders. Approximately 150-200 stakeholders will be asked to set the strategic direction and priorities for the organization. This will allow the Board of Trustees to make knowledge-based decisions. Consequently, the AGD can move from the concept of being a "One-size-fits-all" organization to being more nimble and responsive to our members' needs. We will be able to make strategic based changes without losing the organization's rich 52-year history.

It is important that you realize the AGD leadership is committed to ensuring value and memorable experiences for our membership. We are all excited about these steps. If you have any questions about the process, please call or e-mail so that we may continue this in a positive direction.



The future of the Academy of General Dentistry is bright, according to the more than 130 members who recently traveled to Chicago for the AGD2010: *Innovation through Involvement* conference.

The event, the first of its kind for the AGD, was held April 15-17, and was designed to give stakeholders an opportunity to shape the future development of the organization.

Dental reimbursement issues: A message from the Dental Care Council

Perhaps the most important thing a practitioner can do when dealing with insurance companies and other third-party payers is to carefully read all documents that are signed. This includes both contracts and assignment of benefit checks. Signing a contract with an insurance company to become a participating network provider can legally allow that insurance company to engage in practices such as limiting the amount or frequency of reimbursement or even come into your office, inspect your records, and demand repayment. Likewise, even if you are not a participating provider and accept payment from an insurance company by cashing their check, you might be legally committing yourself to terms that you will later find disagreeable. Some contractual arrangements might even allow the insurance company to switch you from one plan that you like to another that you might not otherwise choose to participate in. For instance, United Concordia recently stated in a letter to the AGD that, "We have found that there is no perfect way to recruit a new dental network that will satisfy all prospective members. An 'opt-in,' rather than an 'opt-out' approach may cause some dentists who want to participate to be excluded because they do not read the notice. And personal contact with each dentist to discuss the pros and cons of the new network may be perceived as overly time-consuming and disruptive. We do not believe our opt-out method is any less fair to dentists than other methods." To reiterate, make sure you know what you're signing, and what the legal implications of your signature are. If you have questions or reticence, please contact the ADA's Contract Analysis Service.

On May 13, 2005 the Ontario Academy of General Dentistry co-sponsored the Seminar "Interceptive Orthodontics" presented by Dr. Brock Rondeau. Dr. Rondeau is a general dentist who has been actively teaching orthodontics for 22 years and has a practice limited to orthodontic and TMJ treatment. Dr. Rondeau is also a contributing editor to Journal of Clinical Pediatric Dentistry, International Journal of Orthodontics and the American Association of Functional Orthodontics. The course discussed the early treatment of constricted maxillary arches, posterior cross bite, constricted mandibular arches, anterior cross bites, thumb sucking habits, airway problems, retrognatic mandibles and deep overbites. The objective of early treatment is to develop the arches to avoid the extraction of permanent teeth. The importance of early treatment was emphasized as 90% of the face is developed by age 12, hence treatment should be started as early as possible. Dr. Rondeau offers a 4 session series of courses in multiple Canadian, US and overseas cities where general dentists can learn to diagnose and treat simple orthodontic cases. 

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Oral Health Messages to Appear in National Publications

his fall, CDA hopes to further its role as the national voice for dentistry dedicated to the promotion of optimal oral health with 2 high-profile public education initiatives.

First, a 16-page oral health special interest guide will be featured prominently in the October issue of *Homemaker's* and its French counterpart *Madame*. This joint venture will include editorial stories on the relation between oral health and general health, brushing and flossing, cosmetic dentistry, oral health information for parents of children and teens, nutrition and oral health, and CDA's 5-point prevention plan. A copy of the oral health guide is included with this edition of *JCDA*.

Homemaker's is a national magazine that targets women between the ages of 25 to 54, the demographic group generally considered the gatekeeper of the family's oral health. It is estimated that more than 2 million Canadians will be reached through this oral health supplement.

Second, a print advertising campaign emphasizing the importance of the CDA Seal of Recognition will also be launched. Using the tagline "Choosing a toothpaste shouldn't be this difficult," the ad campaign will, for the first time, directly target consumers. The ad will appear in tandem with the oral health supplement in *Homemaker's* as well as in the *National Post* and the *Journal de Montréal* daily newspapers. \diamond


- 1. To promote oral health in the community

Guidelines on HIV Prophylaxis Updated

he U.S. Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) have updated their 2001 guidelines on the management of occupational exposures to human immunodeficiency virus (HIV) and recommendations for postexposure prophylaxis (PEP).

The updated guidelines include recommendations for healthcare personnel who have experienced occupational exposure to blood or other body fluids that might contain HIV.

Although the principles of exposure management remain unchanged, recommended PEP regimens have changed. The authors of the revised guidelines advise that clinicians should consider occupational exposures as an urgent medical concern in order to ensure timely HIV PEP.

National Survey Examines U.S. Oral Health

DC released findings from a national survey examining the oral health of Americans.

In its Morbidity and Mortality Weekly Report CDC reported on estimates from the National Health and Nutrition Examination Survey (NHANES), between the 1988–1994 and 1999–2002 reporting periods.

Among other questions, the survey examined the prevalence of decay and untreated decay, dental sealants, edentulism and enamel fluorosis.

Some of the more significant trends between the 2 time periods included a reduction in the prevalence of caries in permanent teeth of up to 10 percentage points among those aged 6–19 years. As well, there was a 6 percentage point reduction in edentulism among those aged greater than 60 years. Disparities were observed when income and education level, ethnicity or smoking status were factored in.

As there are always last minute changes in schedules, it is important for all providers to know their next day schedule so that they can plan what time to come in, have lunch and leave. The Paradigm software has been setup to send out a copy of the day sheet to all providers working the

following day. This enables everyone to plan their schedules and had been very appreciated by the providers.

Dr. Gajjar's office has been set up with five static IP's and a dedicated server. One IP is used solely by Logic Tech. Our technicians can go straight to the

server at anytime to address concerns and update software without any computer being affected. Another IP is used by the Associates and Specialists to be able to login to their files which are stored by username and password. Thus, they can work on documents and view x-rays from anywhere in the world. Another IP is used for an internal video surveillance system. Dr. Gajjar has incorporated IP Cameras for patient security and to ensure quality control. These cameras are accessible only by username and password. Finally, one IP is dedicated for his personal computer which he can



access from anywhere in the world. As Dr. Gajjar is busy with the numerous organizations he is involved with, this feature allows him to be in the office from anywhere in the world. The last IP is kept for possible

future modules. Dr. Gajjar has also been utilizing the ITRANS claims system from Continovation Services Inc for some time now. His EDI is not sent through a dial-up modem, but rather through high speed Internet. His claims

go through faster and don't tie up a phone line. He also needs only one modem rather than having one at every work station that sends EDI. ITRANS also offers Dr. Gajjar the ability to share x-rays and digital images with other practitioners as well as insurance carriers in the



future. Dr. Gajjar also utilizes eQualifIDcc, the credit / debit card application from Continovation services Inc. As with ITRANS, this product allows his office to further utilize his Internet connectivity while avoiding all of the troubles associated with sharing a telephone line for credit / debit card access. As well Dr. Gajjar has been able to realize cost savings over his previous credit / debit solution.

Dr. Gajjar is the President-Elect for the Ontario Academy of General Dentistry, is an executive on the membership council of the Academy of General Dentistry in Chicago and is Vice-President of the South Asian Dental Association. He is a fellow of the Academy of Dentistry International, a fellow of the Academy of General Dentistry and a fellow of the Pierre Fauchard Academy. It really *is* a Small World After All!

n a recent business trip to Orlando, I found time to visit the "happiest place on Earth" — Disney World. Walking past Cinderella's Castle, and the replica of a nineteenth-century Western town, brought back wonderful memories of my favorite childhood ride: the "It's a Small World" ride. This indoor ride takes boat-loads of amusement park goers through a five-minute tour where dolls, representing all the different nationalities of the world, sing the popular "it's a small world"

medley. During the ride, my mind wandered back to the world of organized dentistry, and I began to reflect on how small it is.

From a global perspective the world has indeed become a very small place. 

Root Canals and Dental Implants Equally Effective

Endodontists (AAE) released a position statement on April 3, 2007, regarding treatment planning when considering a root canal or dental implant. The position statement stresses the importance of consider-

ing the patient's best interests. It says, "Quality dental care can only be provided when treatment planning decisions are made by both the dentist and the patient, based on the patient's general health status and specific oral health needs. The recommended treatment should be safe, predictable, cost-effective, respectful of patient preferences, aimed at preserving normal anatomy and function, and based upon the best available scientific evidence."

The statement also indi-

cates that the decision to treat a tooth with root canal therapy or place a single-tooth implant should be based on whether or not the tooth can be restored, the quality of the bone structure, esthetic demands, a cost-benefit ratio, and systemic factors. In addition to considering the probability of overall survival rates of the therapy provided, dentists also should consider risk factors of the chosen treatment.

Eric K. Curtis, DDS, MAGD, an Academy of General Dentistry (AGD) spokesperson who practices in Safford, Ariz., says that when deciding which treatment option is best, "My decisions typically center on concerns about patient health and patient tolerance. Patient health includes both local

Dental implants and root canals are virtually equally successful treatment options for saving compromised teeth, according to a study published in a special supplement to *The International Journal* of Maxillofacial Implants (February 2007), the official publication of the Academy of Osseointegration. The Academy of Osseointegration also published a consensus statement developed by experts from several dental disciplines that supports the study's findings and stresses the importance of making treatment decisions based on individual patient's circumstances.

To assist dental professionals and their patients in determining the most appropriate treatment, the American Association of considerations, such as the existence and extent of infection and bone loss, and systemic considerations, such as diabetes and hypertension. So a root canal, which is typically less invasive than an implant, might be recommended for someone with certain health problems. The patient's tolerance for treatment also might suggest a specific treatment direction."

"While it is true that studies show equal survival rates of single tooth implants and endodontically restored teeth, a major consideration in the decision must be based on the clinical condition and restorability of the tooth," says Neil Gajjar, DDS, MAGD, an AGD spokesperson from Ontario, Canada. This is due to the fact that not only does each procedure have a chance of failure, but each procedure also is subject to long-term survival rates." The dentist needs to consider which procedure will be most beneficial for the patient in the long term.

According to the AAE, its position statement is meant to be used as a guide when deciding how to best treat a compromised tooth. It also is intended to assist dental professionals in evaluating the various risk factors and other implications associated with each of the treatment choices.

Overall, Dr. Curtis believes that patient education is a determining factor when it comes to root canals and implants. Middleclass patients who rely on third-party payers to help cover costs often look for the most time- and cost-saving option. Dr. Curtis says, "Patients must consider the demands of tomogram imaging, tooth extraction and bone preparation, implant placement and time for osseointegration, the placement of a healing cap, the taking of impressions, and crown delivery. Also, there are financial concerns. A patient's dental plan probably won't cover much on an implant. That's why many of my patients still choose root canal therapy as the easier and more practical alternative."

Dr. Gajjar agrees that educating the patient is extremely important when deciding which treatment to administer. "The best way to handle this is by explaining to the patient what is involved with each treatment, the overall prognosis, and the long-term survival rate of the restored tooth."

Dental School Updates

Northwestern Pre-Dental Society

The Northwestern University Dental School closed in 2001, but two undergraduate, pre-dental students there have founded the Northwestern Pre-Dental Society to gather like-minded students. Because of the highly esteemed medical program at Northwestern, the student founders felt that more awareness of the pre-dental program needed to be summoned. More Northwestern students are becoming aware of the profession and have decided it is a good match for them.

U of L Receives Millions for Research

The University of Louisville (U of L) received two monetary awards for study from the National Institute of Dental and Craniofacial Research. Michael Martin, PhD, an assistant professor of dentistry at the U of L, received \$1.4 million to study the role of inflammation in the immune system's efforts to protect the body from disease. Georgios Hajishengallis, PhD, associate professor of dentistry at the U of L, was given \$1.6 million to investigate why the aging immune system gradually loses its ability to fight *P. gingivalis* bacteria, a leading cause of periodontal disease.

SCHIP Update

Rep. Rahm Emanuel (D-IL-5) introduced the Healthy Kids Act of 2007 (HR 2147), which would extend the State Children's Health Insurance Program (SCHIP), streamline enrollment under SCHIP and Medicaid, and amend the Internal Revenue Code to provide for a healthy savings tax credit for the purchase of children's health coverage.

There is a provision for flexibility in this bill that would increase a state's allotment if it is determined that a state will have more children enrolled in SCHIP than the projected number of children to be enrolled.

The bill also would establish grant programs for conducting innovative outreach efforts designed to increase the enrollment and participation of eligible children and promote understanding of the importance of health insurance coverage for children and prenatal care.

Indian Health Care Legislation

Indian Health Care legislation has moved forward in both congressional chambers. In the U.S. House, the Committee on Natural Resources unanimously approved HR 1328, the Indian Health Care Improvement Act (IHCIA). No amendments were offered on either the Community Health Aide Program (CHAP) or the Dental Health Aide Therapist (DHAT) provisions; therefore, they will remain as written: "limited to Alaska and limited in scope of services they can provide." Please refer to the AGD's updated fact sheet about the reauthorization bills at www.agd.org/files/advocacy/policies/ IndianHealthCareReBill.pdf for more details.

Meanwhile, in the U.S. Senate, Sen. Byron Dorgan (D-ND) introduced a virtually identical bill (S 1200), which was referred to the Senate Committee on Indian Affairs.

Dental Education Loan Bill

Rep. Eleanor Holmes Norton (D-DC) introduced the Dedicated Dental Service for HIV/AIDS Act of 2007 (HR 2168), which would establish a dental education loan repayment program. The program is intended to encourage dentists to serve at facilities in areas with a high incidence of HIV/AIDS that have a critical shortage of dentists.

Specifically, the Secretary of the Department of Health and Human Services may enter into an agreement with any dentist under which the dentist agrees to serve for a period of time at such a facility and the Secretary agrees to pay a percentage of the dentist's dental education loans.

With the changes in methods of communicating, the way we market ourselves also has changed.

The Way We Communicate

In January, my flight from India was canceled and I was forced to stay overnight in Delhi. I met a few young university students who were studying in the United States and also were stranded. After spending the day with them, I asked for their e-mail addresses. The students then asked me if I had a Facebook[®] account. Since I was unfamiliar with the site, they explained that it was similar to hi5 and Friendster. I told them I did not have a Facebook account, but I would definitely look into it when I returned to Canada.

Although I had heard about Friendster and hi5, I decided not to open an account because they seemed to be geared more toward dating and other types of relationships. But the way in which these students had described Facebook made me think I should take a closer look at this new technology.

Over the years, the way in which we communicate has changed dramatically. I believe the most radical change came when Microsoft® Messenger was introduced. This simple tool allowed people to communicate in real time with anyone, anywhere in the entire world, for free. Since most computers are set up to sign into Messenger as soon as they are connected to the Internet, users are connected and available for conversation upon turning on their laptops. The technology further improved when Web cams were introduced. People could then hear and see each other on their monitors; they could conduct meetings like never before. Again, this was all for free.

With the changes in methods of communicating, the way we market ourselves also has changed. Local marketing techniques, such as the Yellow Pages, flyers, and television do not have the same return as before. With Web sites, such as YouTube, people no longer have to wait for a specific time to watch their favorite television shows; they can do so at any time by logging on and viewing the shows via streaming videoeither on their computer or on mobile handheld devices. Hence, fewer people now watch television in a traditional way and, as a result, advertising on this medium is much less effective. The age of the newspaper also is fading because people want quick, concise images of activities that are happening

around the world to be delivered directly to their handheld devices. Fewer people read the newspaper, so advertising dollars do not offer the same return as they once did.

Directory advertising companies spent significant capital to develop online portals after viewing studies that showed that most people don't even keep a printed directory, since the information within can be obsolete before it is printed. The only way to obtain current information is by visiting online directories where maps, Web sites, and other pertinent information can be downloaded and printed.

Upon my return to Canada, I received an invitation to open a Facebook account. I visited the site to learn how it works and how people are using it. I believed that joining an online community would be a great way for me to touch base with friends with whom I may have lost contact. Since July, I have added more than 160 friends to my list; many were from my hometown of Stephenville, Newfoundland. Facebook enables you to add yourself to different networks. I have added myself to the networks that focus on where I have lived, where I have worked, and where I have studied. When other friends create accounts and join these networks, they can reunite with me.

What does this have to do with marketing? The answer is simple: Online communities connect people through degrees of separation and create a virtually unlimited referral base for businesses. My online community—a free marketing tool—has resulted in 30 patients referred. Not only have old friends made appointments, but my office has received referrals from friends of my friends.

I have come to realize that my office has spent too much money on television and print media. Neither avenue comes close to the return on investment that has been realized by my Web site, Facebook, or Google™.

At the end of the day, I've learned that if we don't change our marketing methods to adapt to new communication channels, we cannot expect our businesses to realize the same growth we have experienced in the past.

I encourage all non members to take a look at the new AGD and become a part of this great team of dedicated professionals.



Assume your patients' water is fluoridated?

Not in Ontario's Niagara region, where the water supply hasn't been treated since the early '90s. Many local dentists say they are unaware of the situation

Some MUNICIPALITIES IN ONTARIO'S populous Niagara region have had inadequate amounts of fluoride in their water supply since the early '90s, a fact that was not brought to the attention of local dentists until last May, according to the Regional Municipality of Niagara's dental director, Dr. David Klooz.

These inadequate levels of fluoride in the water supply in areas such as Pelham, Welland, and Thorold were not reported to the health department, Dr. Klooz said, because public works legislation states that notification is only necessary if fluoride levels go above recommended levels. However, legislation governing the health department says public works must give notification if fluoride levels fall below rec-

Independent University of Toronto, Brazilian investigations to identify additional causative factors

RECENT SYSTEMATIC LITERATURE review of major studies by Brazilian researchers suggests a positive relationship between stress and periodontal disease, and the findings may be supplemented by an ongoing investigation at the University of Toronto.

The Brazilian report, published in the Aug. issue of the *Journal of Periodontology*, found the majority of studies reviewed between 1990 and 2006 showed a strong correlation between stress, distress, and periodontal disease.

"Our review highlights the importance of psychological factors in periodontology, making it apparent that diagnosis and treatment of psychosocial factors is as important as the clinical treatment of periodontal disease," said lead investigator Dr. Francisco Nociti, of the State University of Campinas, Brazil.

"Stress has been linked to periodontal disease since the middle of the last century and most reports comprise necrotizing forms of periodontal disease," Dr. Nociti noted in an interview with DENTAL CHRONICLE. "In the past decade, more evidence has emerged from epidemiological studies relating peritonitis to stress, depression, and negative life events."

PERIODONTAL DISEASE, STRESS, AND SOCIAL SUPPORTS

Researchers at the University of Toronto have begun a similar investigation into the impact of various social supports such as family or friends on the effects of stress in the development of periodontal disease.



Facing up to Facebook

The way the world communicates has changed, and (30 new patients later) this dentist concludes that's a good thing

HIS PAST JANUARY, FLYING BACK FROM MY ANNUAL trip to India, my flight was cancelled due to fog and overbooking. As a result, I was fortunate enough to meet with a few young American university students who had also found themselves stranded in Delhi. We spent the day together, had dinner, and I proceeded to ask them if they would like to exchange e-mail addresses. At this point one of the students asked me if I had a Facebook account.

I was stumped. I had my Blackberry, cell phone, state-of-the-art laptop, Wi-Fi phone, and a handful of different e-mail addresses—but Facebook? What was that? The students explained it was an online community, where individuals of any age could set up an account using their e-mail addresses. After establishing this initial introduction, individuals are then able to locate and invite friends, acquaintances, and colleagues to join the online community and share contacts, photos, and any other information they would like to share.

This was all new technology to me. However, Facebook seemed intriguing and I wanted to take a closer look.

Facebook was launched in February 2004 as a new means of communication for Harvard students. The site was made available to all students with a designated university e-mail address, and later to the general public in September 2006. Today, the website boasts over 23 million active users across more than 47,000 regional, occupational, collegiate, and secondary school networks. Facebook is now the sixth-most trafficked and number one photo-sharing site in the US.

The Internet and the online communities it has spawned have clearly changed the way we interact. Waiting for the customary dinner party to 'network,' and modestly dispensing business cards are quickly becoming the archaic ways to expand, and do, business. Communication pathways are rapidly expanding, and the way we communicate has dramatically changed.

With methods of communication constantly changing, the way we market our practices, and advertise our services, must also change. It is vital to realize standard local marketing techniques of the past (colored ads, door-to-door flyers, and television commercials) are no longer enough. In fact, they often have a lower rate of return. People expect information to be at their fingertips-preferably on a screen in front of them, and not in some thousand-page yellow, white, or blue book. With websites such as youtube.com and torrent downloads, people watch what they want, when they want. Gone are the days of reorganizing daily timetables to ensure that favorite television show will not be missed. With access to a computer with an Internet connection, almost any show can be viewed online via video streaming. As a result, fewer people are watching television, and an even smaller number are channel flipping-television advertising is becoming increasingly ineffectual.

The golden years of the print press have also been fading. Few people wait for their morning paper to get an image of what happened in the world the day before. As a result, circulations have drastically declined. Advertising in this medium means paying to reach out to a very small, and specific, part of the population—this is certainly not cost-effective.

With the aforementioned changes in modern methods of communication, our methods of marketing must be re-examined if we are to remain relevant. Enter Facebook.

Upon my return from India, I found an invitation to join the Facebook community in my e-mail inbox. Since I grew up in Newfoundland, completed my undergraduate degree at the University of Toronto, and my DDS in Washington, DC, I thought Facebook would be an excellent portal through which I could find old friends and acquaintances.

As of a few months ago, I have added approximately 150 friends to my list, many of whom are from my hometown of Stephenville, Nfld., but Facebook has also enabled me to become a part of countless other networks. When other friends, or acquaintances, create Facebook accounts they are also able to join these networks, and reunite with others.

At this point, the question is: What does this have to with marketing? The answer is quite simple. My Facebook account became a free and incredibly effective marketing tool for my practice. After establishing my account, friends and acquaintances I had lost contact with found out about my practice—as did all of their friends and acquaintances who had Facebook accounts. The result has been more than 30 new patients.

Many of us have heard the adage, "we are all separated by six degrees of separation." In other words, everyone is no more than six acquaintances, colleagues, friends, or family members away from each person in the world. Facebook connects people through minimal degrees of separation. For example, each individual with a Facebook account has a list of 'friends,' and each one of those 'friends' has his/her own account with his/her own list of 'friends.' The beauty is in the connectivity it provides: my friend's friend (who is two degrees of separation away) can access my profile and view my list of friends. This creates an unlimited referrals base.

Having tracked the referrals that come to my office, I have concluded we spend too much money on television advertising and print media—neither of which provides a return similar to the return on investment from our website, Facebook, and Google search engine.

Technological progress is inevitable. The way the world communicates has drastically changed, and trying to avoid these changes by continuing to do business and marketing in the conventional way is futile. We must change our marketing methods. We must adapt to these new forms of communication and use them to our advantage, otherwise we cannot expect our businesses to grow as they have in the past.

U.S. property The right time to invest?

With the Canadian loonie equal to a US greenback, and prices in retreat, the sunbelt real estate market looks like a ripe opportunity. But is it?

HE US HOUSING MARKET—IS THIS THE RIGHT time for you to consider a house or vacation property in the US?

The unequivocal answer to the question posed above is: yes and no.

Clear on this? Not to hedge any bets, but some observers think this is the best time to invest: optimal house prices, great house price appreciation in key areas, and tenants wanting to rent your properties at rents that make your properties cashflow positive. Yet, many of you may be wondering about phrases tossed around during media coverage of these matters, such as 'subprime problems,' 'mortgage chaos,' 'housing market crash.' We will explain.

THE SUBPRIME PROBLEM

The subprime mortgage market lends to people whose income is too low, or whose credit history too patchy, to qualify for an ordinary mortgage.

Subprime borrowers are poorer than those who can obtain mortgages at lower, usually fixed rates. They tended to join the great housing-market party late, when prices were already high. Many appear to have been encouraged to take out loans by brokers who were more bothered about their fees than their clients' ability to repay their debts, and the lenders who made the loans underestimated the potential for future default.

Subprime borrowers—long shut out of home ownership—account for one in five new mortgages and 10 per cent of all mortgage debt. Low short-term interest rates earlier this decade led to a bonanza in adjustable-rate mortgages (ARMs). Ever more exotic products were developed, including "teaser" loans with an introductory period of interest rates as low as one per cent.

When the housing market began to slow, lenders pepped up the pace of sales by dramatically loosening credit standards, lending more against each property and cutting the need for documentation.

A repossessed property will eventually be sold— \$326 billion of repossessed mortgages equates to approximately \$112 billion of losses, which is spread over several years. Consider that about \$600 billion was wiped out on the stockmarkets as share prices fell on Feb. 27th. Any losses ought to be manageable even for banks such as HSBC and Wells Fargo, the two biggest subprime mortgage lenders, and Bear Stearns, Wall Street's largest un*please turn to* **next page**


Trading in a Lab Coat for Legal Robes



Saturday was filled with more spirited discussions and brainstorming activities, as the participants began by identifying what is needed for results-oriented leadership. New leaders help this organization address these issues with new ideas and this conference helped in the development of these up-and-comers. It was great to be a part of it."

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


Ontario Constituency Honoured by AGD

Dental aid plan takes root

Peel Region registers 1,100 seniors in program to help low-income earners receive oral care

Like many low-income seniors, Linda Manicki chose the pain of an infected tooth over the sting of a dental bill.

That all changed a few weeks ago when, after reading about Peel Region's new dental care program for low-income seniors, Manicki became one of the first to receive treatment, ending months of throbbing from an infected tooth.

"I am on a very limited budget and at the end of the month there is no money left over, certainly nothing for a dentist," said Manicki, 65.

Her tooth was removed, and the pain is gone.

Manicki is one of 1,100 seniors in the region who registered for the program after it was announced in mid-November. They will receive treatment within the next six months. Some 479 more are on a waiting list, revealing a demand that surprised even Carolyn Parrish, the Mississauga councillor who pushed hard for the program after being inspired by the *Star*'s 2007 series on dental care for the working poor.

"It has had such an amazing response from people," Parrish said. "It is so fabulous that the program is finally operating. These folks, a lot of them did well in their day, and now they are just trying to hang on. They've paid their taxes for 55 years, but they don't have enough money left to pay for dental care."

Parrish said when the idea was announced in 2007, at least 40 dentists signed up immediately to offer their help. Under the program, the region's public health department pays dentists 70 per cent of their regular fees.

Meanwhile, the province's promised dental program for the working poor, announced in 2007 after the *Star* stories appeared, is nowhere to be seen. The government said it would spend \$45 million a year on basic dental care for those

most in need. Yesterday, a health ministry spokesperson said the commitment still exists and there will be an update in early 2009.

Peel's program is open to seniors living in Mississauga, Brampton and Caledon who sign up through Peel Public Health. They're required to declare a financial hardship that prevents them from paying for dental care themselves.

Dr. Neil Gajjar has a dental practice near Mavis and Derry Rds. One of the dentists who embraced the program, Gajjar currently has five patients going through the system.

"A few years ago, we did a screening program that was intended for children, but what we saw was an overwhelming response from seniors. We realized there was a big void where seniors were not getting the care that they needed, because they are living on a pension cheque," Gajjar said.

Seniors often wait so long for dental care that when they do come in their problems are profound, he said.

"We are seeing them come in with a lot of tartar, tartar that is covering their teeth, which is resulting in infections in their mouths."



Internet Advertising:

What works, what doesn't, and what can't

aving spent a lot of time in Canada and the United States, interacting with dentists of both countries, it is clear that there has been a slowdown in dental office production in both countries. This has been obvious, more so over the last six months than we have previously experienced. Rest assured you are not in this boat by yourself; it is affecting every industry, every profession, including ours.

One of the main principles in marketing is that a business should spend more money in advertising when the economy is slow. This is based on the fact that there are limited dollars being spent

in the market and that your brand should be the one that captures that dollar when it is spent. This has always been the case, but it is less so this time than in the past. The reason being is that there has been almost a stop in the movement of money. When there is very little money people have to spend, even with all the advertising, they may want to spend it with you, but can't. Hence, the key in today's economic condition is to hold tight and weather the storm.

During this slow period, I believe

the best thing to do is work on your website, search engine optimization, and build your social media sites.

However, many still believe that they should spend more money to advertise and over the last few months I have seen some very creative internet advertising – Zoom Whitening for \$99, Light Activated Whitening for \$25, and a Complete Exam, Two Bitewings, and one hour of Cleaning for \$39.

While these dentists have meant well with these creative internet promotions, I can tell you that there are serious problems with the approach.

First, you are not a restaurant where you have something unique to offer and want people to try your food and hope-

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fully keep coming back to your restaurant. Your service is like everyone else, and as such, there is only so far a person will travel and pass so many other dental offices to see you. You will however, drive to the other side of town to eat a good meal and you will recommend the place to others if you like the food.

You may think that you and your staff will provide such good service you will win their loyalty from the patients' current dentist. Do you really think you and your staff are that good and better than the other thousands of dental teams out there? I believe that each has their unique offerings.

Have you ever wondered why these internet 'fans' are coming to your office?

It's not because of your service, but because you are offering your service at a discount. So, by attracting this price conscious client, do you not think they will ask you for a deal on every service you provide? If you gave an 80% discount on the cleaning, why can't you discount their restoration, denture, or implant? Is this the patient you really want?

Do you actually think you are going to get good patients and that these promotions will help build your business? You have



to understand that many people outside your backyard subscribe to these emails. When I mean outside, I mean, Stephenville, Newfoundland and Detroit, Michigan. Remember, when you advertise a deal, many people will subscribe/purchase it to use when they visit. Hence, you will not get any follow up business other than the one-time loss you experienced.

A loss leader works for milk and water, hoping consumers will buy other lower ticket, high margin items, but even these stores are finding themselves having to set limits, something you cannot do in dentistry.

Those are my thoughts on why you should not waste your time and money on this type of internet advertising. However, you may think I'm wrong and want to take the advice of those who advocate the use of these channels. Remember, these guys have an incentive for you to use these channels. You buy product from them at full cost and sell it to recoup half your cost in the hope of getting patients. Who wins? The patient and the supplier!

Regardless, if you don't want me to help save you some money, at least let me help save your dental licence. That's right; the rules in Ontario regarding these advertising channels are much different than those of the United States.

First, you cannot split your fees with anyone other than a Dentist and under certain situations, a Dental Hygienist. The terms of most of these Email Marketing companies is that they take 50% of the revenue received for these services. By you signing a contact with one of these many Email Marketing companies, you are splitting your fees for a particular service and hence subject to professional misconduct and the potential discipline which may include fines and/or suspension from the Royal College of Dental Surgeons.

A second violation is in regards to Referral Fees. A dentist in Ontario cannot pay anyone a fee for the referring of patients to their office. By virtue of these companies charging 50% for referral of patients to your office, this could put you in jeopardy for another area of professional misconduct.

Finally, if reductions of fees are advertised, those reduced fees must be charged to everyone, whether they have third-party coverage or not. Furthermore, by offering reductions to only new patients, you may upset patients who have been loyal to you. If you choose to offer light whitening with no expiry for \$99 or consults, radiographs and cleanings for \$39 to the members of the website, than be ready to do it for anyone for the rest of your life or find yourself with complaints resulting from patient dissatisfaction.

I hope that helps with your marketing decisions, saves you some money, and keeps your Certificate of Registration on your wall.

Dentist Should Advise Vegetarians on Good Oral Health

Health concerns about fat and cholesterol have prompted many people to become vegetarians, and the nutritional deficiencies that can sometimes result may reveal themselves during dental exams.

Academy of General Dentistry spokesperson Dr Neil Gajjar, DDS says he usually asks patients if they adhere to vegetarian or other special diets.

"Most adult vegetarians are very knowledgeable about nutrition; they maintain their diets in a proper fashion. An adult on a vegetarian diet for a prolonged period can be at an increased risk for periodontal (gum) disease from a lack of vitamin D and calcium," says Dr. Gajjar.

Children, however, need a well-balanced and nutritionally complete diet for proper growth, and the potential for deficiencies is greatest among children and teenagers who put themselves on vegetarian diets without knowing enough about their nutritional needs.

Although vegetarian diets vary, some vegetarians, particularly those who do not consume any food of animal origin, can experience deficiencies in calcium, vitamin D, riboflavin, vitamin B12 or complete proteins. Studies show that by eating the right amount of fruits, vegetables, grains and legumes, they can get the nutrients they need. Dr. Gajjar recommends that anyone considering adopting a vegetarian diet seek counseling from their dentist or a nutritionist to learn about substituting foods to get all the necessary nutrients. He also suggests taking a multiple vitamin daily.

Teeth may soften when there is a shortage of vitamin D, becoming more susceptible to decay and periodontal disease. Vitamin D is produced in the body with sun exposure, so deficiencies are rare, but it can develop in those who do not consume milk or fish. Adding vegetable margarines or soy milk to the diet may solve the problem. "Diet is an important part of an individual's medical history, and patients should always inform their dentist if they adhere to vegetarian or other special diets," says Dr. Gajjar.

Dr. Gajjar lectures on managing medical emergencies

in the dental office, has been a lecturer of oral pathology and clinical instructor at the Canadian Academy of Dental Hygiene, and currently serves as a clinical instructor in the Oral Diagnosis and Emergency clinics at the University of Toronto, Faculty of Dentistry.

My experience with teeth whitening services

Some dentists are asking: Why should we determine a low price for whitening, when patients may be prepared to pay more?

ONSUMER-BASED ORAL PRODUCT suppliers spend millions of dollars advertising fresh breath, whitening pastes, mouthwashes, chewing gums, brushes, and home whitening kits. These companies have raised public awareness of oral health and have created a consumer that is ready to pay for whiter teeth. I got into whitening early on, but my first attempts were financial failures. Offering whitening can be good for your practice, but you need to approach it carefully.

When whitening initially hit primetime television, it seemed like everyone wanted it. I would hear people talking about it, inquiring about it, and some even getting it. Since I spent so much of my time marketing, I decided to get an in-office whitening unit. The choice was not based on the quality of the whitening, but rather to simply offer the service and attract business.

It would seem that this would be a very profitable service. Guess again!

MY HISTORY WITH WHITENING

When we quoted \$399 originally for inoffice whitening, we had very little case acceptance. Yes, there is a possibility that we as a dental firm don't have the skills to sell, but I believe that if a product is good and priced right it will sell itself. In 10 years, I have only performed five such whitening treatments. Factoring in kit

and supply cost, reception time, prep time, treatment time, clean up, the result ended up being a bad financial decision.

We also tried offering take-home whitening kits for which we charged \$150. I like the kit because people are able to control the time they insert the trays and hence control potential sensitivity. I would always inform patients to keep the solution in the fridge and to use it the night before a big party to have that bright smile to show off the next day.

The take home kits produced a profit of around \$50. We are a business and we have to make money-not a lot, but some. But even with this small margin, there was limited acceptance of the take home kits. What I realized over the years is that consumers don't want to do anything by themselves. They would rather pay more and have it done for them and better yet, have it done quicker.

So a \$399 price point was not attractive for the in-office whitening and \$150 was not worth it for something they needed to do themselves. At the same time, mall kiosks, spas, hair salons were doing chair-side cheaper-\$99 with a satisfaction guarantee.

So how could they do it and we couldn't? We could!

The secret was that any whitening gel placed on the teeth could be 'activated' with heat/light. A heat/light source would result in the carbamide/hydrogen peroxide breaking down faster resulting in faster whitening. The active ingredients of whitening are carbamide/hydrogen peroxide, mixed with potassium nitrate for sensitivity, in some sort of plastic carrier. The chemicals are cheap, with other costs being associated with the carrier, packaging, marketing, and regulatory fees. These kits should be available for less than \$50 while an attractive looking light with safety standards and control can be found for no more than \$1,000. Companies that sell at these prices are out there, and seeking them out is key to being competitive in whitening.

WHAT TO CHARGE?

Now the question becomes what you should charge for light-activated whitening. In my office we sell one 15 minute session for \$79 and two sessions for \$100. This will leave you a net of \$29 to \$45 depending on the number of sessions. The beauty of this system is that the patient is in the decision position of whether they want two sessions. Almost 75% of patients opt for the second session; the \$79 seems like a good price point to start the process.

The key is fair and honest pricing. One of the comments that I have heard from dentists is why should I sell whitening for such low prices when people are willing to pay hundreds of dollars? Even if the provider's volume is low, their profit outweighs them doing it more cheaply.

Whitening is one of the few items we can sell at a discount and increase volume as opposed to all other things we offer. Remember, we are required to disclose the cost of the product to the patient and show any additional charges as a professional service fee. A service fee significantly higher than the cost of materials may leave your patients thinking your fees are too high. If they think your whitening fees are too high, they may think the same for your other services.

When a patient asks why your whitening is so much more expensive than others, what can you say to justify the cost and remain honest? The Internet is there to call your bluff. These days, our patients are very educated and information is available at their keyboard. There are multiple postings by consumers who discuss their experiences, research and comparisons. These postings are highly accurate, unbiased information, and will likely be more valued than those from any dentist. So, the only way to avoid deceptive sales tactics is to always speak the truth.

The flip side of this is why not offer whitening for free to bring new patients in the door? I never liked this approach and never advertised free whitening. For one thing, anything free has no value. It also opens the door for people to bargain for other services and ask for freebees on top. Finally, it opens up the door to misleading advertising and professional misconduct.

Providing light-activated whitening at a reasonable cost not only makes you look honest and trustworthy, it provides everyone with an opportunity to experience the benefits. It makes people more conscientious of their smile, oral health, and results in them requesting more cosmetic dentistry from you.

At the end of the day, you have a patient that got something at the price point they wanted, they were able to get it done right away in a safe environment under your supervision and you possibly opened up the door for further work by a fair and trustworthy dentist-you.

patient could be experiencing Bechet's syndrome.

It is significant that clinicians differentiate between lesions that cannot be scraped off, such as leukoplakia and leukoedema, and lesions which can be scraped off with a tongue blade, such as pseudomembranous candidiasis.

A leukoplakia can range from something benign like a callus to something much more severe like a cancer. "There are a lot of possibilities," says Dr. Siegel. One visual clue is that redness in a leukoplakia is an ominous sign, with about 4 to 6% being malignant at the time of biopsy. The prognosis becomes increasingly poor with increasing redness of the lesion.

OTHER CONDITIONS TO WATCH FOR

Pseudomembranous candidiasis is more likely to occur when the immune system has been suppressed in some way such as when a patient is taking antibiotics. The most common sites of pseudomembranous candidiasis are the tongue, buccal mucosa, and the palate. Therapies can include systemic anti-

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fungal medications as well as a modification to diet.

"You get yeast overgrowth because you wipe out the competing bacteria," explains Dr. Siegel. "The best defense is [consumption of cultured yogurt."

Some benign lesions can originate from contact with a new toothpaste or mouthwash, and ceasing use of the mouthwash or toothpaste will lead to resolution of the lesion in about two weeks. Similarly, ASA burn can occur, and it can be treated with a bland diet and warm, salt water rinses, with the lesions generally healing without scars in about two weeks' time.

Habits such as lip biting or cheek biting, which are very common, can also lead to hyperkeratoses, but the white lesions do not undergo malignant change. They vary in appearance depending on how severe the habit is. To help correct the habit, Dr. Siegel suggests that patients be fitted for an appliance.

As a general rule, lesions that persist and remain unchanged for a two-week period should be biopsied, Dr. Siegel said in conclusion.

AGD Attends Legislative Conferences

Academy of General Dentistry (AGD) leaders and staff attended both the American Legislative Exchange Council (ALEC) Annual Meeting, Aug. 7 to 9, 2013, in Chicago, and the National Conference of State Legislatures (NCSL) Legislative Summit, Aug. 12 to 15, in Atlanta. During these events, AGD leaders and staff took the opportunity to speak with lawmakers about the interests of general dentistry and offer solutions for the oral health issues facing America.

"Attending the ALEC Annual Meeting positions the AGD as a credible resource for information when legislation related to oral health is on the table," Dr. Donald says. "It gives us the chance to present our positions directly to lawmakers in a way that's not typically possible."

At the NCSL summit, the AGD exhibited in conjunction with the American Dental Association and the American Academy of Pediatric Dentistry. AGD Legislative & Government Affairs Council Chair Joseph A. Battaglia, DMD, FAGD, and Region 19 Trustee Carol A. Wooden, DDS, MAGD, met with nearly 300 state lawmakers and discussed pending state legislation affecting dentistry, as well as issues regarding midlevel providers, oral health literacy, and fluoride.

"The NCSL Legislative Summit offers the AGD the chance to discuss with lawmakers our commitment to advocating for our patients, our members, and the public," Dr. Battaglia says. "It's important to establish personal contact and create long-lasting relationships with state lawmakers from districts across the country, since they are responsible for implementing solutions that ensure our nation's citizens receive high-quality oral health care." ONLINE REPUTATIONS:

The internet's dirty little secrets and how it can kill your practice!

s an avid marketer of my dental practice, I sometimes Google my name and specific keywords to see what comes up and where I rank. Over the last few weeks, I noticed two negative reviews on consumer rating sites.

In the past, when a patient had left a negative review, my staff and I would quickly go through the schedule and charts to see if we could identify the patient. However, our last two were somewhat different, in that the reviewer was very specific about their experience and alleged that our positive reviews were "fake." Immediately, I had our staff go through all of the charts over the last few months and try to recall the patient and the situation. I wanted to ensure that if we had done something wrong or did not handle the situation to the patient's satisfaction, that we are at least able to take corrective action; if not for that specific patient then for our future patients.

As many businesses do, we invest a lot of time and money into our marketing and provide the best service that we can. But the irony is that the more we expose our business to the market, the more susceptible we become to these types of reviews which can be counteractive and, personally, quite bothersome. The unfortunate part is that once it is up online, it is there permanently. It was not until a few days ago that things appeared much clearer to me. I was on my way to a meeting in New Orleans and had a stop-over in Atlanta where I ran into an old friend who owns multiple brand name hotels all over the United States. We started talking about his business and how the hotel industry has become a very competitive and saturated market — just like dentistry.

He shared with me that he recently hired a new Director of Communications, who came from another hotel chain, and since hiring him sales had gone up. His job was to stay on top of hotel review sites, thank people for posting their positive experiences and address any negative experiences from the management side. He informed me that by having more postings and responses, the major search engines will start to rank the hotel higher in consumer searches; making it easier for people to find his hotels over others. What he told me next blew me away. His new Director of Communications was also responsible for leaving negative comments for competitor hotels. I was stunned and could not believe that he would be involved in such an unethical and deceptive practice. His response was that he did not even know about it until his Director of Communications had told him and that it is a very common practice in his industry. Recently, a gentleman named Peter Hook, who describes himself on Twitter as "director of propaganda" for Accor hotels in Asia and the Pacific, was caught publishing a number of crit-



ical reviews about the company's rivals. Now things started to make sense to me. I decided to do some more research on the topic, specifically in the dental industry.

Reviews on most sites are unverified, meaning anyone can create an identity and post an experience. Amazon.com is such a massive ecommerce player where anyone can leave a review on any product. Some popular sites say that suspicious reviews are investigated; others claim they have software to detect automatic postings, and *RateMD.com* claims that they track IP addresses so that the same user is unable to continuously post positive or negative reviews. Regardless of any anti-fraud measures, there are many ways around it. People can stoop to using multiple usernames and can post from different locations to prevent using the same IP.

Studies have shown that a one point increase on a five point scale can command up to nine percent increase in revenues for businesses (Harvard Business Review). However, in this new world of online marketing and the 'power consumer reviews,' it has resulted in a new kind of business around Reputation Management. Some of these companies offer to pay people \$5 for every fake review they write, while others just have a team of writers overseas that are just churning out fake consumer reviews. The latest being caught and fined in this practice are a number of companies in New York. A total of 19 firms collectively agreed to pay more than \$350,000 in fines and stop posting bogus online reviews touting clients using a Bangladesh company to write fake reviews, being paid from \$1-\$10 per review (USA TODAY). On Freelancer.com, there are 200+ ads for people to produce fake reviews for sites.

Georgios Zervas, coauthor of a recent study "Fake It Till You Make It: Reputation, Competition, and Yelp Review Fraud," concluded that at least 16 percent of the reviews are fake.

Most people are not aware that posting false reviews is against the law. It is also very difficult to track and has become a new type of crime where 'reputation' companies can make millions driven by corporations who want to increase their bottom line. According to Scheiderman Edward Telmany, US Coachways's chief executive, "We get bashed online, we are losing money from this." Telmany told his employees to write favorable reviews and posted a five-star review himself on Yelp that began: "US Coachways does a great job!"

Another misleading practice that has come up in the dental industry is one where a company has set up an online review site for practitioners in which mainly negative reviews are posted. If you contact the company for verification of these reviews, you likely will not get a response back. However, you may be contacted by an Online Reputation management company offering to have the comments removed for a fee. It has come to light that most of these manageMost people are not aware that posting false reviews is against the law

He has also acted and continues to act as a marketing consultant to numerous dental drug, suppliers, and device manufacturers. ment companies are owned by the online review sites that have posted the negative reviews and will have those postings removed but for a price. Sounds a lot like extortion in the digital age, right? Kathleen Richards investigated this practice and has written an article called "Yelp and the Business of Extortion 2.0," where owners say Yelp offers to hide negative customer reviews on its website for a price.

In a 2012 Ipsos MediaCT study commissioned by Google, 69 percent of business travellers researched a trip online and 54% read reviews from other travellers; a similar trend that is also growing in the medical/dental field as more people check for reviews when choosing a practitioner for themselves and for their children. My wife did the same when we were expecting our first and second child by researching every OB and pediatrician.

SO WHAT CAN BE DONE TO AVOID BECOMING A VICTIM?

Educating the public about these practices is the first step. I am sure you will never look at an online review the same way after reading this article and the same goes for our patients. If they understand that not all what is written is true, they will use that information more carefully or may not at all.

This is not to say that all sites are bad. Many are credible and give verifiable information to consumers by having reviewers log on and provide their information before posting.

Another tactic to combat bad reviews is to encourage satisfied patients to leave good reviews. Many offices do this by having monthly draws for free gifts like electric toothbrushes for those that have liked them on Facebook or have posted an online review of the office.

One approach that some dentists in the United States have tried is having their patients sign a non-publish agreement along with the patient intake forms. Some practitioners have even sued patients for posting to online sites about their experiences. Dr. Stacy Makhnevich was a New York City dentist who made use of a bizarre form provided by a company called "Medical Justice." Her patients were expected to sign this form, through which they assigned copyright in all their reviews of the dental practice and the doctor to the doctor herself, enabling her to use copyright notices to censor any criticism of her that appeared online.

In a day where every dentist is trying to get on the front page or the first result in an online search, many have resorted to paying search engines to be in that top search. The problem is that other dentists are learning to instruct their staff to click the competitor's link in the morning multiple times to use up their daily budgets and have them no longer appear at the top; another deceptive practice, which I am always told, all is fair in Love, War and Dentistry.

The good news is that as online sites strive to deliver accurate information to become a trusted and credible source for its users, they themselves are engaging in practices to ensure the reviews are from actual clients. In addition to setting up a client profile, some are working with companies like hotels, airlines and restaurants to send out email requesting reviews from existing customers. It's a win-win for all parties involved as it prevents fraudulent emails from non-clients, and keeps the website credible while encouraging more reviews and higher rankings for the business. Eventually, as the number of posts increase via smartphones, you will only be able to post reviews of places you actually have visited.

There is a whole science dedicated to identifying false reviews, like the overuse of superlatives or "I" and "we," or the fact that most fake reviewers spend less than a minute to write their reviews. Real reviews, however, will often have photos uploaded by the user which shows that the reviewer was actually there. But just as more information is published on fake reviews, these reviewers change their patterns to blend in and it once again it becomes a cat and mouse game.

As we move into the future and digital age, a new level of fraud will continue to emerge. When arming your security system and locking your front door, be advised that this is no longer the only method to protect your assets. There is a whole world of cybercrime that can cost you more than a laptop or a tablet. Stay current and employ internet safety measures that keep you and your business safe.

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In Memoriam: Albert Wasserman, DDS



Albert Wasserman, DDS, a former Academy of General Dentistry (AGD) president, passed away on Dec. 26, 2013, in his hometown of San Mateo, Calif.

Dr. Wasserman attended the University of California, San Francisco (UCSF) School of Dentistry, graduating in 1943 with concurrent Bachelor of Science and Doctor of Dental Surgery degrees. He began his career as a lieutenant in the Army Dental Corps, and his wartime experience inspired his lifelong pursuit of knowledge in the dental profession.

After completing his service with the Army, Dr. Wasserman returned to Northern California where he rented a small room in a San Mateo medical building and opened a one-room office with war surplus dental equipment and no employees. He maintained a busy private practice for 43 years and remained active in organized dentistry after his retirement.

Dr. Wasserman was president of the California AGD from 1965 to 1966, and served as AGD president from 1971 to 1972. He founded the Academy of Dentistry International (ADI), and he also held numerous leadership roles with the American College of Dentists (ACD), the California Dental Association, the California Board of Dental Examiners, and the UCSF Dental Alumni Association.

He earned his AGD Fellowship in 1962 and his Mastership in 1971. He also was a fellow in the

ADI, the ACD, the Royal Society for Public Health, the American Association for the Advancement of Science, the American School Health Association, the International College of Applied Nutrition, the International College of Dentists, the Pierre Fauchard Academy, the Society of Oral Physiology and Occlusion, and more. Dr. Wasserman served as a clinical instructor in fixed prosthodontics at the University of the Pacific Arthur A. Dugoni School of Dentistry, where he was a member of the postgraduate faculty for many years. He also served his alma mater as clinician and table clinic chairman, in addition to his executive roles with the alumni association. A popular speaker, Dr. Wasserman gave lectures all across the world, from San Mateo to international locations like France, Japan, Singapore, China, and the Philippines.

He published articles in several journals, including General Dentistry, the Academy Review of the California Academy of Periodontology, the Journal of the California Dental Association, the South Carolina Dental Journal, and Clinical Preventive Dentistry. He developed unique research and received a patent on hydraulics adapted to removable prostheses.

Dr. Wasserman is survived by his wife, Dunia, and his three children: Robert, a musician and recording artist in Los Angeles; Bruce, a general dentist and writer in Cody, Wyo.; and Cindy, also a musician and recording artist in Los Angeles. In addition, Dr. Wasserman was proud of his five grandchildren, Raechelle, Rebecca, Sara, Meir, and Keren, and his nine great-grandchildren.

Proposed Bylaws Amendments for the AGD 2016 House of Delegates

Chapter VI, Create a New Section 5: Student Chapters

Several dental schools have organizations that are essentially AGD chapters or, more accurately, components of AGD constituents. Several schools have inquired about establishing such groups. However, there are no formal provisions within AGD policy or its Bylaws to provide for such organizations. The AGD Dental Student Program Task Force is recommending the adoption of a Bylaws provision that would formally provide for student AGD organizations at dental schools. The task force believes that student chapters will facilitate membership growth and retention.

Chapter IX, Section 2 (A–B): Clarification of Council and Committee Appointment Authority

This proposed amendment clarifies existing policy and practice that it is the president-elect who makes council and committee appointments at the appropriate timing during the governance year before he or she assumes the office of president. All such appointments would continue to be subject to board approval.

Housekeeping: Board Meeting Nomenclature — Entire Bylaws

In 2014, the House of Delegates approved the separation of the AGD scientific session from the annual meeting. With the new format for the governance year, it was necessary to rename the board and Joint Council meetings. The Governance Year Task Force decided that rather than use a season to describe the meetings, a Roman numeral system would be implemented. The board approved this change for the Board Policy Manual at the April 2015 board meeting. This proposal would update the Bylaws accordingly wherever there was a seasonal reference.



Canada are surprised at work.The credit system in Canada may not always take into account financial history in another country and the concept of building a credit his-tory can be unfamiliar, especially in places where cash or your bank balance is the most important financial consideration.

One of the first things you should do if you are new to Canada, is gain a better understanding of Canada's financial system. Speak with an RBC Advisor, take the time to ask the important questions and do everything you can to immerse yourself in the Canadian system. In fact, according to the poll, newcomers would encourage others in their situation to go to the branch (39%) or meet with a financial planner (34%) to get free financial advice. Another one – third (29%) would encourage people to sign up for free financial literacy sessions to learn

about banking in Canada.

Impaired driving charges thrown out over violated rights Can-India News Service

Because police failed to give Bikkar Khandal access to a Punjabi interpreter following his arrest on impaired driving charges, a Brampton judge has dismissed the case. The judge was out-raged that Mr Khandal's rights had been violated.

Initially police at-tempted to accommodate his language need but it

didn't pan out. So here's what hap-pened. Back in October 2015, Mr Khandal was arrested at a RIDE spotcheck in Mississauga. Once Khandal had been brought to the police division, the arresting officer called duty counsel who provide free legal advice over the phone to in-

dividuals under arrest and also requested a Punjabi interpreter, according to Monahan's ruling. A lawyer was brought in to represent him, but since he spoke English and Mr Khandal had limited understanding of the language, it was deter-mined that Mr Khandal could not have had a proper consultation with

counsel. The Judge excluded the breath sample evidence as a result calling the decision "a relatively easy one" given the circumstances.

Khandal first blew 140 mg of alcohol in 100 mL of blood - nearly twice the legal limit – and a half-hour later blew 130 mg of alcohol in 100 mL of blood, according to the ruling.

The week draws to a close with a red carpet fashion show on Saturday featuring the lines of 16 designers, including locals Chavez, Shilango and Wheneber.

"(Mississauga's) industry is working to be established," said Sayed. "We have a lot of talent and a lot of diversity in designers, but they don't always have a platform to show (what they can do)."

Peel board to include all-gender washrooms in every high school

 $E_{\rm gender}$ washroom this school in Peel Region will have an all-gender washroom this school year, director Tony Pontes

announced Wednesday morning.

Speaking to hundreds of staff at his annual kick-off to the school year, he said the Peel District School Board must make sure all students feel safe.

"Last year I talked about a designated bathroom at Jean Augustine Secondary School (in Brampton) for students who self-identify as trans and need a place of safety ... Since then, I have had lots of conversations about this. About why students or staff would selfidentify. Why do they need a separate bathroom? Some

believe that identification is counter to their personal beliefs. "Bottom line - it is not our role to ask why someone selfidentifies, it is not about our personal beliefs and what bathroom they choose is not our business. Our job is that when they do identify, we make sure they have a place of safety - just as we do for every other student."

Last fall, Pontes and the board took a firm stand on the new health curriculum, saying while parents have the right to pull

their kids from sex-education lessons, they could not opt children out of lessons or talk about gender equity.

He mentioned the sexeducation controversy again Wednesday, saying the curriculum "was, without a question, a point when we chose to stand behind our value of inclusion."

He said he's "proud to say that within this school year, every secondary school will have a designated bathroom for students," with a sign that says "inclusive washroom."

He also said the board

will "continue this conversation to our middle schools" as well as establishing gay-straight alliance groups for senior elementary students as well.

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

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

ADVOCACY Hill Day 2018 Promotes Oral Health Literacy

AGD leaders, members and students met in Washington, D.C., June 18-19, to advocate on behalf of general dentistry during AGD's annual Hill Day. Nearly 40 attendees from across the U.S. and Canada flew in to attend a conference hosted by AGD and to meet with legislators. Over 65 meetings took place on Capitol Hill June 19.

One of the two priorities for 2018 was promoting oral health literacy programs and funding. Rocky Napier, DMD, AGD Legislative & Governmental Affairs Council member, joined Lynn Mouden, DDS, MPH, vice president, dental director of quality and performance at Avesis, on a panel discussing the importance of oral health literacy programs. Napier expressed his concern that the Centers

for Disease Control and Prevention does not offer information on prevention as it pertains to oral health. Rep. Mark Meadows (R-NC), who was in attendance to close Monday's session with a speech, noted that he would work to resolve this issue. Mouden noted that an effective way to garner attention to the issue of oral health literacy is to show the ways in which poor oral health is related to conditions like diabetes and heart disease. These points were met with general agreement.

Attendees' second priority was funding Health Resources and Services Administration (HRSA) programs and promoting the full functionality of the chief dental officer (CDO) position to their



legislators. Captain Renee Joskow, USPHS, DDS, MPH, FAGD, HRSA CDO, presented HRSA's ongoing projects related to oral health.


Meadows concluded Monday's session with anecdotes about working in Congress during the current administration. He articulated his goal to pass appropriations bills as soon as possible.

Prior to departing for their legislator meetings on Tuesday, attendees heard from dentist and Congressman Mike Simpson (R-ID). Simpson addressed current issues in Congress and thanked attendees for their work as advocates for general dentistry.





Feds announce \$1.25bn to fight homelessness in 2019

OTTAWA

Cities like Toronto hoping for a cash infusion from the feds can now tap into \$1.25 billion over the next nine years through the Liberal government's cornerstone homelessness strategy. The Liberals agreed to

overhaul the program after hearing complaints from cities about cumbersome reporting requirements, inadequate funding and unrealistic expectations about how quickly the money should be spent. Anti-poverty advocates have waited since the summer to find out how funding will move.

The revamped homelessness strategy, dubbed "Reaching Home," happens early next year and cities will be able to apply for funding. Municipal governments administer most of Canada's

housing programs but construction and rent construction and rent subsidies are expensive, so the cities rely on provincial and federal governments to support them. This money should help up to six large federal cities qualify for annual federal funding, joining 61 cities already considered

"designated with access to yearly contributions from the federal

government. Territories are also being promised \$43 million over the nine-year period. There will also be new

spending targeting Indigenous people. Details of the Reaching Home plan are being laid out as the Liberals prepare to introduce legislation to put into law a strategy to lift more than two million people out of poverty. More details will be announced over the next few weeks.



Engineering a More Connected Profession

New AGD President Neil Gajjar's Ambitions for Organized Dentistry

eil Gajjar, BSc, DDS, MAGD, FADI, FPFA, FICD, FACD, hails from a family of engineers. "Building and construction were always of interest to me," he says. For Gajjar, dentistry — with its combined emphasis on technique and technology — is its own form of engineering. As AGD's new president, Gajjar intends to bring the same industriousness to the organization, building and strengthening its network of dentists and making more resources available to empower both dentists and the general public to advocate for oral health.

Gajjar earned his undergraduate degree in chemistry from the University of Toronto and his Doctor of Dental Surgery from Howard University in Washington, D.C. After working as an associate for two years, he established his own private practice in Mississauga, Ontario. Today, his practice staffs six associate dentists, a prosthodontist, an orthodontist, an anesthesiologist and a denturist. "We're a bread-and-butter family dental practice," said Gajjar. Since it opened in 2002, the practice has grown to offer a range of pediatric and adult services, including sedation dentistry and dental implants, and, after a 2015 expansion, has grown from six operatories to 12.

For Gajjar, details matter. "Anything we can do to make things easier, faster or more comfortable for patients, we look into," he said. Gajjar's office - from the position of the entrance to the orientation of the dental chairs - was designed according to Vaastu Shastra, Hindu architectural principles, to foster positive energy. His practice was among the earliest to offer Wi-Fi to patients, and it recently phased out magazines from the waiting room, replacing them with public-use iPads. His staff members collectively speak nine languages — English, Hindi, Gujarati, Punjabi, Italian, Persian, Arabic, Laotian and Urdu. "Second-language skills are an asset," said Gajjar. "When we hire people with these skills, we can deliver care to a greater demographic."

Gajjar is active in his local community: he makes visits to local schools; he has sponsored a local badminton league; and he has received the City of Mississauga's Civic Award of Recognition for his volunteerism. For Gajjar, approachability and relationship-building are integral to providing quality care. "We concentrate a lot on the human element," he said. "It's important to understanding where people are coming from and to let them know that we will work with them. And it's important to let them know why they need care and what options they have; that's where it starts."

His community focus extends into professional development. Gajjar has been active in organized dentistry since he graduated in 1999. He's held leadership roles and committee positions at regional and North American dental associations, including the Ontario Dental Association, the Canadian Dental Protective Association, the Ontario AGD, the Academy of Dentistry International and the Royal College of Dental Surgeons of Ontario.

In the early 2000s, he helped found the South Asian Dental Association. "There were, and still are, a lot of new dentists coming from overseas to the Greater Toronto area. So, we created an opportunity for dentists of a similar background, who were treating a similar patient pool, to exchange ideas and skills. The idea was that they are able to learn from each other and from our courses," he said.

During his term as president of the Ontario AGD, Gajjar championed new membership recruitment and strengthening the constituency's continuing education programs. Gajjar's leadership team helped the Ontario AGD expand its membership measurably, and it earned AGD's Constituent of the Year Award, Constituent Editors Award and honorable mentions for the Continuing Education Award of Excellence and the Membership Award. Recognizing AGD's unique position to empower dentists across national borders, he has since continued to scale up his scope of influence, serving AGD as regional director, Region 15/16, from 2010 to 2015, as secretary, 2015 to 2016 and as vice president, 2016 to 2017. Says Gajjar, "Dentists in Canada and the U.S. often face similar issues, and fostering communication and sharing resources through AGD allows both countries to benefit."

The first South Asian and youngest dentist elected AGD president, Gajjar hopes to see AGD expand its reach and look to technology to support its mission. "Our members want to be connected to other dentists," he said. "They want to know what should be done in specific clinical situations, which courses they should take, which courses are worth their money, and which ones will make them better dentists. We need to incorporate technology to give them what they need." ◆

Governance Highlights from AGD 2018 Annual Meeting

AGD's Annual Meeting of the House of Delegates was held Nov. 2–4 in Chicago, where it installed new officers and adopted new policies. AGD President Neil J. Gajjar, DDS, MAGD, delivered a speech that addressed the organization's past, present and future. Some of the topics that Gajjar discussed included:

- Increasing membership. Gajjar suggested that, to bolster membership numbers, AGD must "answer why we started, why we exist and what we can offer our members." He said that, at its core, the organization exists to make life easier for general dentists by teaching practice management tips, clinical skills and "small things that no one teaches in school."
- **Maximizing potential.** Gajjar said that, in addition to targeting new members from traditional markets, AGD needs to maintain the prestige associated with being an AGD member. It must better understand traditional markets before entering new ones.
- **Continuing education.** AGD faces increasing competition in the continuing education (CE) market. In order to remain relevant, Gajjar suggested that AGD continue to blend education with gamification and build a state-of-the-art electronic system for registering and tracking CE.
- Advocacy. "If we want to grow, we need to advocate more for our members," Gajjar said. He explained that AGD must understand that there are two categories of members, those who are employed and those who are self-employed, and it must tailor programs for both groups.
- **Public awareness.** "We need to make the public aware of who we are," said Gajjar. In order to accomplish this, the organization has to invest more funds into its future. "We need to dream and, if we really believe we can be there, the reality will be that we are there. We need to be willing to take risks."
- **Technology.** Dentistry is being changed by rapid advances in technology that allow patients to diagnose many problems with their smartphones. AGD must also use technology to stay abreast of these developments and properly safeguard public health. "We cannot operate the same way we did 40 years ago when members came by horse and carriage from all over the country to make policies, to make the profession better and deliver better care for our patients," said Gajjar.

Gajjar ended his speech with a call to action for all AGD leaders in attendance. "I now turn to you and ask that you raise your level of commitment to the organization, too," he said. "Don't ever hesitate to let us know how we can help you and improve AGD. Don't ever hesitate to let us know how we can prepare for the future. What may seem like a silly idea may in fact be the next big game changer. We need to be open and engaged, and we need to do it together."

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BRIDGING THE GAP

DIVERSITY, EQUITY AND INCLUSION WITHIN DENTISTRY ENABLE BETTER ACCESS TO CARE

entistry in the United States and Canada has made significant gains in workforce diversity in the past 50 years. Dental care for historically marginalized groups has

also increased. Superficially, these two concepts may not seem to have a causal relationship. However, promoting diversity, equity (guaranteed fair treatment, access and advancement) and inclusion within the profession is an essential way for dentistry to successfully expand care to underserved populations. Having a dental workforce that is inclusive of all genders, races, sexualities and backgrounds better prepares the profession to serve the oral health needs of populations that need it most. Dentistry benefits from empowering practitioners who are sensitive to unique cultural and health needs and who bring experiences to the profession that strengthen its collective capacity for empathy and nuanced care.

While much progress has been made encouraging diversity within certain groups, more remain underrepresented. Universities, professional associations and government organizations are working to bolster diversity, equity and inclusion in the profession. Concurrently, continuing education providers, dental schools and specialized clinics are among those introducing current practitioners to cultural competency training programs that prepare them to better understand patients who have backgrounds with which they may be unfamiliar.

Embracing the growing trend of diversity in dentistry means the ability to care for more patients. But much work still needs to be done.

The Current State of Diversity in Dentistry

In terms of workforce demographics, dentistry has diversified significantly, though unevenly, over the past few decades. The biggest gains are in the representation of Asian and female dentists. In 1983, Asians only accounted for 6.2 percent of enrollees in dental education programs.¹ Today, they are both the second highest percentage of enrollees (24.7 percent in 2016) and the second highest percentage of applicants to dental education programs (31.6 percent in 2016).² Unlike other minority groups, the proportion of practicing dentists of Asian descent was greater than the proportion of Asians in the U.S. population.³


Female dentists are also approaching parity. Though they still only constitute 32.3 percent of practicing dentists (as of 2018 data), women make up 48.5 percent of dental school graduates.⁴ These numbers are particularly remarkable considering women only accounted for 4.6 percent of dental school graduates in 1976.⁴

Researchers point to a combination of legal, educational and governmental

efforts as important influences for bringing more women and minority dentists into the profession.

However, dentistry continues to suffer representational disparities across certain demographic lines. Black, Hispanic or Latino, and American Indian or Alaska

Demand for practitioners who can relate to and understand the context and needs of underserved populations remains high.

Native dentists are still underrepresented within the overall dental workforce.

One of the largest continuing gaps exists with black dentists. Black students only constituted 5.2 percent of enrollees in dental programs in 2016, though black people accounted for 12.3 percent of the U.S. population.² A 2012 article published in the Journal of Dental Education reports that "data from 1975 to the present shows that the percentages of African American students have not increased substantially."1 A 2017 study found that black dentists in the workforce face unique obstacles: higher than average educational debt, a greater likelihood of being the first in their family to graduate from college and lower reported annual income.4

Initiatives in Representation and Inclusion

Recognizing the progress that remains to be made in the dental field, associations, universities, corporate foundations and government organizations have been charting a new path with initiatives and policies aimed at recruiting more underrepresented dentists and supporting them throughout their education and careers. Some major projects include the American Dental Association's 2010 National Summit on Diversity in Dentistry and subsequent Diversity and Inclusion Plans; the Robert Wood Johnson Foundation's Pipeline, Profession, and Practice: Community-Based Dental Education program; and the establishment of the American Dental Education Association's Center for Equity and Diversity.

Rosa Chaviano-Moran, DMD, professor and assistant dean of admissions at Rutgers University, and Darryl Pendleton, DMD, associate professor and associate dean of student and diversity affairs at the University of Illinois at Chicago (UIC), are among the network of professionals working within the university setting to promote diversity and inclusion.

For both Chaviano-Moran and Pendleton, a critical step has been to make changes to the admissions process.

At Rutgers, Chaviano-Moran helped institute a holistic admissions process. In addition to quantitative metrics, such as a student's GPA and standardized test scores, the admissions team at the Rutgers School of Dental Medicine also considers factors such as a student's community involvement, working hours, leadership experience, familiarity with the profession, demonstrated compassion for others, motivation, status as a firstgeneration college student and special aptitudes.

"Not everyone can afford a test prep course or private university tuition," said Chaviano-Moran. "Holistic admissions allows us to select students who are interested in dentistry, but who may not have had the same exposure or opportunities as other applicants."

The UIC College of Dentistry has also adapted its admissions policies to attract students who bring unique backgrounds and perspectives. "It's not just about racial and gender diversity," said Pendleton. "We also have to consider things like a potential student's geography and socioeconomic status."

Chaviano-Moran and Pendleton also help oversee their schools' pipeline programs. One component of these programs is outreach to children and young adults from underrepresented communities in elementary, middle and high schools to introduce them to the dental field. Outreach to younger children typically involves a classroom visit by a dentist to introduce students to basic oral health principles. Programs for high school and undergraduate students can include hands-on activities at the dental school, clinical observation, symposiums and admissions counseling.

Chaviano-Moran and Pendleton both recognize that recruiting students is only one component of supporting diversity at the university level; they also stress the importance of creating an inclusive environment for underrepresented students while they are attending school. Rutgers and UIC support student groups that aim to better connect the communities of students they bring into the program, such as clubs for LGBT students and student chapters of national organizations such as the American Association of Women Dentists and the Indian Student Dental Association. They also offer mentorship opportunities and prioritize faculty diversity.

The Work of Associations

Dental associations also make major efforts to recruit and support underrepresented minority dentists. Some have been doing this work for decades. Organizations such as the American Association of Women Dentists and the National Dental Association were formed in the early 20th century with the intention of advancing female and black dentists within the profession. Organizations such as these offer a professional network, career development opportunities and tuition scholarships for minority dentists and dental students. Sarita Arteaga, DMD, MAGD, is president of the Hispanic Dental Association Foundation (HDAF), an organization that works with the Hispanic Dental Association to award scholarships to dental assisting, dental hygiene and dental students. "The goal is to support this changing workforce and help to develop and recruit into the profession those leaders and professionals who will provide for the Hispanic and underserved communities," she said. The HDAF has distributed over \$518,000 in scholarships since 1995.

Arteaga explains that increasing representation of minority dentists is about more than just equity within the profession; it also makes the workforce better able to provide for those who may not be getting the care they require.

"Increasing the number of healthcare professionals who can relate to this growing population and understanding their needs will help reduce disparities," she said. "It's important to have an understanding of how cultural and religious beliefs can impact healthcare decisions, not just an understanding of the language. Having a thorough understanding of social determinants of health can improve healthcare outcomes overall."

A Diverse Workforce to Support Diverse Patient Populations

Health disparities between populations have been well documented in the United States and Canada for decades, and factors such as cost, barriers to access, stereotyping and bias continue to negatively influence patient care, treatment acceptance and health outcomes across communities. Research and policy across healthcare fields have consistently maintained that training a diverse workforce is an important step toward improving care delivery and addressing these continued disparities.⁶

Demand for practitioners who can relate to and understand the context and needs of underserved populations remains high. Within dentistry, the same populations that are underrepresented in the American and Canadian workforce blacks, Hispanics and American Indian/ Alaska Native populations — also experience large disparities in both access to dental care and oral health status.³

Communities of color are reported to experience higher rates of tooth loss and

untreated tooth decay and receive fewer preventive services. Moreover, Asian, black and Hispanic children remain less likely than white children to have even one dental sealant, and Asian and black seniors are much more likely than white seniors to have lost all of their teeth.⁷

In addition to race-based disparities, the National Healthcare Disparities Report, published in 2017 by the U.S. Department of Health & Human Services, acknowledges that access to care also varies by socioeconomic status, age, sex, disability status, sexual orientation, gender identity and residential location. Populations that experience poverty at higher rates — such as LGBT populations, seniors, immigrant communities and rural communities — can find themselves systematically priced out of seeking the care they need.

Research across the healthcare field has also found that even when individuals from these populations are able to seek care, they are more likely to encounter negative bias and stereotyping from practitioners and staff.⁸ Healthcare providers have been shown to demonstrate more negative attitudes toward blacks, Latinos, Native Americans, overweight/obese individuals, gay and lesbian people, individuals with lower socioeconomic standing, injecting drug users, and wheelchair users with spinal cord injuries.⁹ Within dentistry specifically, a 2018 study concluded that dentists were significantly more likely to recommend root canal treatment to white patients and significantly more likely to recommend extraction for black patients.⁸

Researchers and practitioners who treat these underserved populations contend that having staff from a variety of backgrounds is a necessary part of providing quality care.

AGD president and private practitioner Neil Gajjar, DDS, MAGD, agrees.

"A diverse workforce is essential," said Gajjar. "Patients want to feel respected and understood. If you can speak to them in their language and understand what questions and concerns they are bringing into the office, that's critical."

Gajjar is a South Asian dentist based in Mississauga, Ontario, a Canadian city with a large percentage of immigrants — South Asian immigrants especially. He explains that the South Asian population has beliefs, customs and backgrounds that impact how practitioners should provide care to them.

"A large part of India is vegetarian. So dentists might hear questions about whether dissolvable sutures or capsules have meat products in them," said Gajjar. "You need to know what toothpastes don't have gelatin. And, if you're treating a Sikh patient, you may have to think about things like, 'Is it OK for me to ask them to take off their turban so we can get a panorex?"

Brooks Woodward, DDS, director of the Chase Brexton Health Care dental program, also emphasizes the integrality of understanding and honoring a community's unique needs to reduce oral health disparities. Founded in 1978 to serve Baltimore's gay community, Chase Brexton today treats a large percentage of patients who identify as lesbian, gay, bisexual and transgender (LGBT).

"The most important element is for patients to feel recognized and respected for who they are," said Woodward. The clinic employs a diverse workforce and has an onboarding process intended to build a practitioner's understanding of the nuances of delivering care to the LGBT population. For example, practitioners and staff are trained to communicate using language and vocabulary that

affirms the patient. Woodward explains that dental professionals start by taking time to identify how patients wish to be addressed, what pronouns they prefer and whether they have a preferred name that may not be the one on their driver's license or insurance card.

Moreover, the dental clinic offers all services — including preventive, restorative, endodontic, oral surgery and fixed and removable prosthetics — at slidingscale fees to all patients. This payment strategy is an attempt to recognize and reduce the economic barriers to care for a population that is disproportionately affected by low socioeconomic status, unemployment, underemployment and lack of health or dental insurance.¹⁰

Woodward notes that, while the care and specialized services Chase Brexton provides are "not often found in other community health centers," all practitioners can improve their cultural competencies in treating the LGBT population by seeking out cultural competency training courses specific to that group.

Looking Ahead

Within the dental school domain, many universities now offer — and sometimes require — courses that teach culture, communication, and public health skills or clinical experience in extramural patient settings where students can offer care to diverse populations. As more diverse students enter dental programs, and dentistry curriculum continues to fill the gaps in the field's cultural awareness and public health skills, current disparities may continue to decrease.

In addition to joining dental associations and continuing their education, dentists who want to support diversity, equity and inclusion can find courses offered by independent providers about providing care to minority populations. Patient literature in other languages is available online, as are blogs, articles and best practice guidelines for providing culturally competent care.

Gajjar, who co-founded the South Asian Dental Association, affirms that practitioners who are not a part of the communities they treat have much to gain from familiarizing themselves with groups and education that promote equity and cultural sensitivity. "Canada has a big immigrant population, and all providers want to be able to communicate with their patients to give them the best care," he said. "I think dentists who are committed to understanding the unique needs of their patients can find opportunities out there to learn from other people who are seeing the same problems." **♦**

Why You Should Care About Your Kid's Cavities

Cavities aren't a rite of passage for growing children, but a costly, inconvenient, and sometimes corrosive abnormality.

Parenting is an exhausting job, and often the one thing that gets left by the wayside is kids' oral health. After all, cavities are a normal part of childhood, right?




"Hopefully it motivates you to think about what kind of leaders you want to be," said Burton.



"Buccal injection of articaine to anesthetize the palatal mucosa"

Buccal and palatal injections of anesthetic agents are required before maxillary tooth extrac-

tions, but palatal injections are painful. After sectioning and measuring cadaveric hemimaxillae, Abu Sharkh et al concluded that the uniformly thin, cancellous maxillary bone, when coupled with the diffusion properties of articaine, allows buccal infiltration to produce palatal anesthesia, eliminating the need for a palatal injection.

નવેમ્બર ૪, ૨૦૧૮ ના રોજ કેનેડા ના ડો. નીલ જે. ગજ્જર જનરલ દંત ચિકિત્સા અકાદમી, જે ૪૦૦૦૦ થી વધુ દંત ચિકિત્સક સભ્યો સાથેની વિશ્વની સૌથી મોટી દંત સંસ્થા છે તેના સૌથી નાના અને દક્ષિણ એશિયા ના પ્રથમ પ્રમુખ બન્યા.

ડો. ગજ્જર નો જન્મ સ્ટેફેનવીલ, ન્યૂકાઉન્ડલેન્ડ માં થયો હતો અને તેમના માતા-પિતા અમદાવાદ ના મૂળ વતની છે. તે વારંવાર ગાંધીનગરની મુલાકાત લે છે અને ઘણી સારી રીતે ગુજરાતી ભાષા બોલી જાણે છે. પ્રમુખ તરીકે તેમની નિયુક્તિ થતા સમયે તેમણે કહ્યું હતું કે "આ મારા મારે, મારા પરિવાર માટે તથા કેનેડા અને ભારત માટે ગર્વની ક્ષણ છે."

એકેડેમી ઓફ જનરલ ડેન્ટિસ્ટ્રી (એજીડી) એ ૪૦૦૦૦ થી વધુ દંત ચિકિત્સકોનું સામાન્ય વ્યવસાયી સંગઠન છે જેઓ જાહેર જનતાને દાંતની સંભાળ અને મૌખિક આરોગ્ય શિક્ષણ પ્રદાન કરવા માટે સમર્પિત છે. ૧૯૫૨ માં સ્થાપના થયેલ એજીડી વિશ્વની સામાન્ય દંતચિકિત્સકો માટેની સૌથી મોટી સંસ્થા છે જે સામાન્ય ડેન્ટિસ્ટની જરૂરિયાતો પૂરી પાડે છે તથા તેમના હિતોને રજૂ કરે છે. દંત ચિકિત્સાના ક્ષેત્રમાં ગુણવત્તા શિક્ષણથી લઈને માત્ર સિદ્ધિ-આધારિત પુરસ્કારો પ્રદાન કરીને, એજીડી ખાતરી કરે છે કે અમારા સભ્યો તાજેતરના વલણોની જાણકારી તથા ગુણવત્તા શિક્ષણ સાથે ટોચ પર રહે અને સામાન્ય દંત ચિકિત્સા માં શિક્ષિત અવાજ તરીકે ઓળખાય. એજીડીના એવોર્ડ વિજેતા પ્રકાશનો. વ્યવસાયમાં નવા ઉત્પાદનો તથા ટેકનોલોજીના સ્ત્રોતો તરીકે તેમજ વિજ્ઞાન, ફાર્માકોલોજી અને ડેન્ટલ મટિરીયલ્સમાં પ્રગતિ તરીકે માનવામાં આવે છે.

પ્રમુખ તરીકેના એક વર્ષના સ્વયંસેવક કાર્યકાળ દરમિયાન, એ.જી.ડી. માટે ડૉ. ગજ્જરનો દ્રષ્ટિકોણ ગુણવત્તાયુક્ત શિક્ષણ દ્વારા સામાન્ય દંતચિકિત્સા અને મૌખિક આરોગ્યના ક્ષેત્રને આગળ ધપાવવાના સંસ્થાના ધ્યેય સાથે બરાબર મળતો આવે છે.

ડૉ. ગજજરના કહેવા પ્રમાણે "એજીડી એક અસાધારણ સીઇ પ્રોગ્રામ ધરાવે છે, પરંતુ ઘણી વસ્તુઓની જેમ, આપણે તેને વધુ વિકસિત કરી શકીએ છીએ.સંસ્થાની સૌથી મોટી શક્તિ આપણા સભ્યોમાં રહેલી છે. આપણી પાસે સભ્યો છે જે શીખવા, તેમની કુશળતાને સુધારવા અને તેમના દર્દીઓને શક્ય તેટલી શ્રેષ્ઠ કાળજી આપવા માટે સમર્પિત છે. આપણી પાસે સામાન્ય દંત ચિકિત્સાના વ્યવસાયમાં વિશ્વાસ ધરાવનાર સભ્યપદ છે જે ઉદ્યોગ, સહકર્મીઓ અને તેમના દર્દીઓ ના હિત માટે હિમાયત કરશે."

કરીને સંગઠનને વધુ અઘતન તકનીકી અને સ્વયંચાલિત પ્લેટફોર્મોને સમાવવા માટે પ્રોત્સાહન આપવાનો ઇરાદો રાખે છે. એન્જિનીયરોના કુટુંબ માંથી આવતા હોવાથી તે સમજે છે કે કેવી રીતે ટેકનોલોજી, એ એજીડીની કાર્યક્ષમતા અને કામગીરીમાં નોંધપાત્ર રીતે સુધારો કરી શકે છે.

ડૉ. ગજજર, જે એકેડમી ઓફ જનરલ ડેન્ટિસ્ટ્રીના માસ્ટર છે, તેમણે એજીડી સભ્ય તરીકેના તેમના કાર્યકાળ દરમિયાન અન્ય નેતૃત્વની તથા અન્ય મહત્વપૂર્ણ ભૂમિકા ભજવી છે. છે. પ્રમુખ તરીકે સેવા આપતા પહેલા, ડૉ. ગજ્જરએ બોર્ડના ઉપપ્રમુખ અને સચિવ તરીકે સેવા આપી હતી. તેમણે અનેક એજીડી સમિતિઓ - એજીડી સભ્યપદ, દંત શિક્ષણ, અને જૂથ લાભો અને વાર્ષિક મીટિંગ કાઉન્સિલ્સ પર પણ કામ કર્યું છે.

સ્થાનિક સ્તર પર, ડૉ. ગજજર ઑન્ટારિયો એજીડી, દક્ષિણ એશિયન ડેન્ટલ એસોસિએશનના ભૂતપૂર્વ પ્રમુખ તથા કેનેડિયન ડેન્ટલ એસોસિયેશનના સભ્ય છે. તેમણે એકેડેમી ઓફ જનરલ ડેન્ટિસ્ટ ઇન્ટરનેશનલ માટે કેનેડા ઇસ્ટ રીજન્ટ તરીકે સેવા આપી છે. આ ઉપરાંત, ડૉ. ગજજર કાઉન્સિલર તરીકે ચૂંટાયા હતા અને રોયલ કૉલેજ ઑફ ડેન્ટલ સર્જન્સ ઑફ ઑન્ટેરિઓ સાથે વિવિધ સમિતિઓમાં સેવા આપી હતી.

તેમને યુનિવર્સિટી ઑફ ટોરોન્ટોમાંથી રસાયણશાસ્ત્રમાં સ્નાતકની ડિગ્રી મળેલ છે. ત્યાર પછી ડૉ. ગજજર એ વૉશિંગ્ટન, ડી.સી.માં હોવર્ડ યુનિવર્સિટીથી ડોક્ટર ઑફ ડેન્ટલ સર્જરી પ્રાપ્ત કરેલ છે, જે ઓરલ ડાયગ્નોસિસ શિક્ષકોને એનાયત કરવામાં આવે છે.

ડૉ. ગજજર એ અમેરિકન એકેડમી ઑફ ડેન્ટિસ્ટ્રી ઇન્ટરનેશનલ, કોલેજ ઓફ ડેન્ટિસ્ટ્સ, ઇન્ટરનેશનલ કોલેજ ઓફ ડેન્ટિસ્ટ્સ, પિયર ફૌઅર્ડ એકેડેમીના ફેલો છે.અને સિડેશનના ક્ષેત્રમાં માં માન્ય પ્રમાણપત્ર ધરાવે છે.

ડૉ. ગજ્જરએ તેમની અમેરિકન ડેન્ટલ એસોસિયેશનની રાષ્ટ્રીય બોર્ડ ડેન્ટલ પરીક્ષા ભાગ ૧, ભાગ ૨, તેમજ નેશનલ ડેન્ટલ પરીક્ષા બોર્ડ ઓફ કેનેડાની પરીક્ષાઓ ઉત્તીર્ણ કરેલ છે. તેઓ રોયલ કૉલેજ ઑફ ડેન્ટલ સર્જન્સ ઑફ ઑન્ટેરિઓ દ્વારા પ્રમાણિત (લાઇસેન્સડ) છે.

ડૉ. ગજજર સતત શિક્ષણમાં રુચિ ધરાવે છે અને ડેન્ટલ ઑફિસમાં તબીબી કટોકટી સાંભળવા વાળા સમર્પિત લેક્યરર રહ્યા છે. આ ઉપરાંત, તેમણે ઔપચારિક રીતે કેનેડિઅન એકેડેમી ઑફ ડેન્ટલ હાઈજિન ખાતે મૌખિક આરોગ્યના શિક્ષક પેથોલોજી અને ઓરલ ડાયગ્નોસિસમાં ક્લિનિકલ પ્રશિક્ષક તરીકે સેવા આપી છે.

ડૉ. ગજજર તેમની પત્ની અને બે બાળકો સાથે ઑન્ટારીયોના મિસિસૌગામાં રહે છે.



On November 4, 2018, Dr. Neil J. Gajjar of Canada became the first South Asian and youngest president of the Academy of General Dentistry, the world's largest dental organization for general dentists with over 40,000 members.

Dr. Gajjar, who was born in Stephenville, Newfoundland is the son of parents from Ahmedabad, India. He frequently travels back to Gandhinagar and speaks fluently in Gujarati. When being installed as president, he said, "This is a proud moment for me, a proud moment for my family, and a proud moment for Canada and India."

The Academy of General Dentistry (AGD) is a professional association of more than 40,000 general dentists dedicated to providing quality dental care and oral health education to the public. Founded in 1952, AGD is the largest association for general dentists in the world and serves the needs and represents the interests of general dentists. From quality education to the only achievement-based awards in general dentistry, the AGD ensures our members stay on top of the latest trends, access quality continuing education, and are distinguished as the educated voice in general dentistry. AGD's award-winning publications are respected in the profession as sources for the latest product and technology, as well as advances in science, pharmacology and dental materials.

During his one-year volunteer term as president, Dr Gajjar's vision for AGD aligns with the organization's goal to advance the field of general dentistry and oral health through quality education and advocacy.

"AGD has a phenomenal CE program, but like many things, we can develop it more," said Dr. Gajjar. "The organization's greatest strength rests in our members. We have members who are dedicated to learning, refining their skills and delivering the best care possible to their patients. We have a membership that believes in the profession of general dentistry who will advocate for the industry, their colleagues and their patients."

During his tenure as AGD's president, Dr. Gajjar intends to use his influence to encourage the organization to incorporate more advanced technological and automated platforms. Coming from a family of engineers, he understands how technology can significantly improve the operations and efficiency of AGD.

Dr. Gajjar, who is a Master of the Academy of General Dentistry, has fulfilled other leadership and constituency roles during his tenure as an AGD member. Prior to serving as president, Dr. Gajjar served as the board vice president and secretary. He has also worked on several AGD committees and councils — AGD Membership,

Dental Education, and Group Benefits and Annual Meeting councils. On the local level, Dr. Gajjar is the past president of the Ontario AGD, the South Asian Dental Association and a member of the Canadian Dental Association. He has served as the Canada East Regent for the Academy of General Dentist International. In addition, Dr. Gajjar was elected as Councillor and served on various committees with the Royal College of Dental Surgeons of Ontario.

He received an undergraduate degree in chemistry from the University of Toronto. Dr. Gajjar went on to receive his Doctor of Dental Surgery from Howard University in Washington, DC, awarded the Teachers of Oral Diagnosis Award. Dr. Gajjar is a Fellow of the Academy of Dentistry International, American College of Dentists, International College of Dentists, Pierre Fauchard Academy and holds a certification in intravenous sedation.

Dr. Gajjar has completed his American Dental Association's National Board Dental Examination Part I and Part II, as well as the National Dental Examining Board of Canada exams. He is licensed with the Royal College of Dental Surgeons of Ontario.

Dr. Gajjar is passionate about continuing education and has been a committed lecturer on managing medical emergencies in the dental office. In addition, he has formally served as a lecturer of oral pathology at the Canadian Academy of Dental Hygiene and as a clinical instructor in the Oral Diagnosis and Emergency Clinics at the University of Toronto, Faculty of Dentistry.

Dr. Gajjar lives in Mississauga, Ontario, with his wife and two children.

In September of 2019, Dr. Chad P. Gehaniwill be installed as president of the American Dental Association (ADA), when he will lead the ADA's 163,000-member organization. He is the first South Asian to be elected to this position, an organization known as one of the leading advocate for oral health in the United States.Dr. Gehani was elected during a meeting of the ADA House of Delegates in Honolulu. Heis a Clinical Associate Professor of Endodontics at New York University,New York, and alsoan international presenter who has been very active in teaching in South Asia.

The not-for-profit ADA is the nation's largest dental association, representing 163,000 dentist members, which has advocated for the public's health and promoted the art and science of dentistry since 1859. The ADA's stateof-the-art research facilities develop and test dental products and materials that have advanced the practice of dentistry and made the patient experience more positive. The ADA Seal of Acceptance long has been a valuable and respected guide to consumer dental care products. It's Journal of the American Dental Association is the ADA's flagship publication and the one of best-read scientific journal in dentistry.

Since 2014, Dr. Gehani has served as the Second District trustee to the ADA Board of Trustees, and was a delegate in the House of Delegates from 2000-2014. Dr. Gehani was previously the president of the New York State Dental Association and the Queens County Dental Society.

Over the course of his career, Dr. Gehani has earned a number of fellowships from prominent organizations, including the International College of Dentists, American College of Dentists and the Pierre Fauchard Academy. In addition to the ADA, Dr. Gehani is a member of the American Association of Endodontists and the Indian Dental Association (USA). Dr. Gehani has received several awards, including the Ellis Island Medal of Honor, which recognizes Americans who dedicate their lives to community service, from the Ellis Island Honor Society, and the Distinguished Service Award from The Pierre Fauchard Academy, New York Section, in 2008. Lifetime achievement award from The Indian Dental Association (USA). Best Teacher award from The International College of Dentists .

Dr. Gehani graduated from the University of Mumbai (India) and from the Columbia University College of Dental Medicine. He practices in Queens, New York, where he lives with his wife Rekha, who is also a dentist. Two of their three children are dentists and the other is a physician.

Both Drs. Gajjar and Gehani are looking forward to working together in promoting the profession and ensuring optimal oral health for patients.

Advocacy

AGD 2019 Hill Day

AGD leaders, members and students met in Washington, D.C., April 29–30, 2019, for AGD's annual Hill Day event. Nearly 40 attendees from across the United States and Canada flew in to advocate for the general dentistry profession, meeting with 55 members of Congress over two days.

The issues AGD members advocated for were repealing the McCarran-Ferguson Act, funding for oral health literacy campaigns and support for the Resident Education Deferred Interest (REDI) Act.

As part of Monday's program, attendees were addressed by three dentist congressmen who are longtime advocates for oral health and the dentistry profession: Reps. Drew Ferguson, DMD (R-Ga.), Jeff Van Drew, DDS (D-N.J.), and, for the keynote address, Paul Gosar, DDS, (R-Ariz.).

Attendees also heard from Health Resources and Services Administration Administrator George Sigounas, MS, PhD, regarding the agency's efforts to promote oral health literacy.

Additionally, American Dental Association (ADA) Senior Vice President, Government and Public Affairs, Michael Graham, MPP, and Director of Congressional Affairs Chris Tampio spoke to



attendees about the ADA's advocacy efforts and provided valuable insight into the current political environment in Congress and how AGD's policy priorities are affected by it.

Finally, a representative from the office of Rep. Brian Babin, DDS (R-Texas), briefed attendees on the REDI Act, of which Babin is the sponsor.

Tennessee Dentists Exempted from Professional Privilege Tax

Over two years of effort finally bore fruit as a legislative initiative resulted in Tennessee dentists no longer being subjected to an annual \$400 professional privilege tax. S.B. 0398/H.B. 1262 was signed into effect May 24, 2019, by Governor Bill Lee. Beginning on what would have been the next due date for payment of the tax — June 1, 2020 — Tennessee dentists join 14 other professions in exemption from the tax. Tennessee AGD lobbyist Mark Greene participated in a coalition of professional groups seeking repeal of the tax. Meetings began in the fall of 2017 with key administration officials, legislative leaders and all members of the finance committees.

Tennessee dentists thank the bill's sponsors — Sen. Brian Kelsey (R-Germantown) and Rep. Andy Holt (R-Dresden), along with Lt. Gov. and Senate Speaker Randy McNally, Former House Speaker Glen Casada, legislative leaders and members of the finance committees.

For new Tennessee dentists embarking on a 30-year career, this new bill will save them \$12,000 over the course of their careers.

Dental Practice Council Member Attends American Association of Dental Consultants Workshop

Dental Practice Council member Tyler L. Scott, DDS, represented AGD at the annual Spring Workshop of the American Association of Dental Consultants (AADC), May 1–4 in Scottsdale, Arizona. AADC's membership consists of dental consultants (dentists who, as independent contractors, provide consultation services for dental benefit plans) and nondentists who are involved with the administration of dental benefits. Over 250 dentists attended the annual event, which serves as both an educational and networking event.

Scott noted that the meeting featured excellent continuing education, including several claims review sessions that provided a valuable look inside the mindset of dentists who review claims. "That insight is helpful to me as the Dental Practice Council prioritizes developing tools to help AGD members navigate the claims submission process," said Scott.

The Power of 'Quiet Influence'

There is a certain kind of person I have come to admire. If you're lucky, you'll recognize the description because you have a person (or people) like this in your life.



Academy of General Dentistry Supports Water Fluoridation Statement from Neil J. Gajjar, DDS, MAGD, President, Academy of General Dentistry

Researchers recently published a study questioning the effectiveness and safety of water fluoridation based on maternal exposure to fluoride during pregnancy.1 The Academy of General Dentistry (AGD) believes that, according to generally accepted scientific research, fluoride remains safe at the concentrations found in optimally fluoridated water and is a community health measure that benefits children and adults. As oral health professionals, we believe further research should be conducted before the public changes its water consumption habits, especially during pregnancy. We believe that there are too many variables in this study to come to any definitive conclusions, including a lack of funding and a sample size too small to capture true demographics and other environmental or genetic influences.

AGD continues to assert that, when used appropriately, fluoride is safe and effective in preventing and controlling dental



decay.

Tooth decay affects more children in the United States than any other chronic infectious disease, according to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC). The CDC states that, if left untreated, tooth decay can cause pain and infections that hinder eating, speaking, playing and learning. The problem is pervasive, with 92% of adults ages 20 to 64 having had dental caries in their permanent teeth.2 This number has been found to increase when fluoride is removed from community water supplies.

The controlled addition of a fluoride compound to public water supplies is considered to be the most cost-effective way to prevent cavities and fight tooth decay. The United States Public Health Service has established that the optimal concentration for fluoridation is 0.7 parts per million.3 This range effectively reduces tooth decay while minimizing the occurrence of

dental fluorosis. Fluoride helps prevent tooth decay by making teeth more resistant to acids that attack enamel and are derived from bacteria in the mouth and certain foods and drinks. By drinking optimally fluoridated water, all members of society ---regardless of income, education or ethnicity — can benefit from better oral health, not just those who have access to dental care.

Despite the fact that good oral health is essential for the overall health of both mother and child, a significant number of women in the United States do not visit a dentist during pregnancy. Dental care during pregnancy is not only safe and effective, but also essential for combating the adverse effects of oral disease. During pregnancy, women should continue brushing their teeth twice a day and flossing once a day.

All water supplies, including bottled water, should have appropriate fluoride levels. Simply put — regular fluoride use throughout life will help protect teeth.



That's exactly what happened at AGD2019, where more than 2,300 forward-thinking dentists met with top speakers and industry leaders to propel dentistry forward. With courses on a range of topics at every level of expertise and an expanded focus on hands-on, participationbased learning, AGD2019 took continuing education and dentist-branded fun and networking to the next level.

Next-Level Learning

AGD2019 offered courses across 28 distinct subject areas, including implants, periodontics, prosthodontics and even forensic dentistry.

Keynote speaker Henry Lee, PhD, presented his talk, "Forensic Dentistry: The Criminal Investigation," on Thursday morning during the opening session. During the lecture, Lee covered the latest advances in forensic dentistry and how they are used in criminal investigations, but he also gave the audience some advice about letting the community's needs guide the trajectory of your career.

"In 1998, my career was kind of in a crossroads," Lee explained. "After serving as chief criminalist and as


Connecticut State Police laboratory director for about 25 years, I could retire. But the governor asked me to be the state police commissioner. I didn't want to be a chief; I didn't want to be a director. I just wanted to do my little work, just like dentists — happy in the dental clinic. But this governor was pretty smart and went to see my mother. And my mother talked me into becoming commissioner. My mom said, 'It's not what you want to do; it's what you can do for the people.' AGD's goal — outreach to the community — is a wonderful thing."

Later that morning, Lee also presented a lecture on "New Technology in Human Identification," where he went beyond fingerprints, anthropological analysis, blood typing and dental record comparison and introduced attendees to new concepts and technologies such as image recording and enhancement, artificial intelligence, facial recognition technology, big data mining and rapid DNA typing. He also presented case examples of these new forensic techniques in practice and illustrated the importance of human identification in criminal and natural disaster investigations.

The learning continued throughout the weekend with informative courses on a wide range of topics. Joel L. Rosenlicht, DMD, taught a special oral surgery course package that spanned three days and provided a blend of lecture- and participationbased courses.

Several courses also introduced attendees to new treatment modalities they could add to their services offered. Gigi Meinecke, DMD, FAGD, presented courses on facial injectables like Botox^{*} and dermal fillers and how they can be incorporated into a dental practice to provide a more comprehensive esthetic service for patients. Meinecke also described how Botox can be used to treat gummy smiles without the need for crown lengthening.

Also featured were multiple courses on sleep dentistry, including "Using Oral Appliance Therapy and CPAP to Treat Obstructive Sleep Apnea" by Sue Ellen Richardson, DDS; "Starting Your Sleep Practice: Science to Success" by Andrew Swiatowicz, DDS, FAGD, AADSM; and "Sleep Solutions: Parts I and II" by John C. Comisi, DDS, MAGD. Treating obstructive sleep apnea can be a revenue-generating addition for practitioners and a lifesaving treatment service for patients.

Silent Auction and Free Oral Cancer Screenings Support AGD Foundation's Initiatives

The AGD Foundation continued its work to fight oral cancer by offering free oral cancer screenings and hosting an electronic silent auction during AGD2019 to support future oral cancer initiatives.

The screenings were held on Friday, July 19, in the Exhibit Hall. AGD2019 attendees licensed in Connecticut volunteered to provide the screenings, and those screened included attendees, exhibitors and employees of Mohegan Sun. Volunteers screened 362 people for oral cancer, 332 of whom were Mohegan Sun employees.

"It's an important initiative because 53,000 people each year are diagnosed with oral cancer and another 15,000 are diagnosed with human papillomavirus strain 16, which is linked to oropharyngeal cancer," said Maria A. Smith, DMD, MAGD, who co-chaired the oral cancer screening event. "It's a very significant disease. The problem with oral cancer is that, by the time it is found, it is usually late stage, so early detection is absolutely key to saving lives. We are the first line of defense, and providing free screenings is one way we can give back to the community in response to this silent and deadly disease."



Alliance for a Cavity-Free Future holds 10th global summit

The <u>Alliance for a Cavity-Free Future</u> (ACFF), a non-profit organization whose aim is to prevent dental caries and whose aim is for "every child born after 2026 should stay cavity free during their lifetime," held its 10th annual global summit in conjunction with the ADA-FDI meeting on September 7th in San Francisco. There are ACFF chapters around the world; the Canada-United States Chapter, led by Dr. Margherita Fontana (U.S.) and Dr. Bob Schroth (Canada), was launched in October 2015, and I've been a consultant for the Indian Health Service within that chapter.

ACFF sponsors World Cavity-Free Future Day, which will be held October 14, 2019. The goal of this year's

campaign is to raise awareness for parents and caregivers about dental caries in young children, especially in the areas of oral care and sugar consumption. The Academy of General Dentistry's Standards for Continuing Education

Abstract

The Academy of General Dentistry works to raise the standards of general dentistry, primarily through intensive continuing education. Since the 1960s, AGD has guided general dentists to educational opportunities that meet appropriate standards and recognized those who have achieved 600 hours of education and passed a comprehensive examination with a fellowship designation. There is a further level of accomplishment, requiring an additional 500 hours of education, culminating in a master's designation. In recognition of additional training and community service, AGD dentists can earn the Lifelong Learning and Service Recognition. This award can be achieved multiple times. AGD provides a service to the entire dental profession through its Program Approval for Continuing Education (PACE) system. CE providers can be recognized for meeting 13 standards/criteria, including those for administration, fiscal responsibility, learning objectives, evaluation, and self-instruction and electronically mediated programs.

C ince its founding in 1952, the Academy of General Dentistry (AGD) has striven to raise the standard of excellence for general dentists. AGD accomplishes this goal primarily by offering high-quality continuing education (CE) specifically suited for general dentists and by recognizing its members who have exceeded industry expectations for the advancement of their professional educations with the earned distinctions of fellow (FAGD) and master (MAGD). These distinctions are voluntary, but they far exceed the CE requirements of state licensing boards and demonstrate a commitment to furthering one's education in order to provide superior care for the benefit of one's patients.

The Importance of CE

In 1966, one of AGD's founding members, Thaddeus V. Weclew, wrote about the need for continuing education in the Journal of the American Dental Association, noting that, "Up until the late 1950s, there was little pressure for continuing education from the profession." He went on to say that, "Unless the recipient of a degree earned 10 to 30 years ago progressively reinforces his knowledge with current developments and ideas, Supreme Court decisions, advances made in antibiotics, new concepts of science, and other forward strides that have been made, his degree will have become obsolete. The practitioner...has not fulfilled the debt owed himself and the community if he is not keeping up with the current advances of his profession."

With the astoundingly fast rate of change and technological advancements in modern dentistry, it is likely that, if you are an experienced and established clinician, there are procedures you perform differently from how you were taught in dental school; if you are a student now, it is likely that the landscape of dental materials will change before you reach the middle of your career, and so will the technologies you use in your practice. The education you receive in dental school is only the beginning.

Voluntary standards represent a commitment to personal excellence and professional growth. AGD members are committed to maintaining and building on their proficiency beyond simply meeting state dental board CE requirements. In order to broaden patient access to care and services, the general dentist is expected to have a much wider knowledge base than a specialist and ensure that this knowledge base is up to date, making CE that much more important. The founders of AGD recognized that the CE needs of general dentists differ from specialists, and, therefore, the driving force of AGD has been to provide that broadbased lifelong learning to general dentists. Due to the variety and number of services dentists provide to their patients, if a general dentist

settles for the minimal number of CE credits required by the state licensing board, the dentist risks falling behind on important new knowledge within the profession. It is impossible to stay current with every area of care general dentists provide without exceeding the minimal CE requirements.

In order to formally recognize members who prioritized professional growth in the form of CE, the AGD fellowship program began in 1962. The FAGD distinction requires the completion of 500 hours of CE, at least three years of membership, and the passing of a comprehensive fellowship • exam. The MAGD distinction was created in 1968 for AGD members who wish to continue beyond the FAGD distinction and requires the completion of 600 additional hours of CE.

These distinctions serve two important purposes: On the surface level, they recognize practitioners who have made a commitment to lifelong professional education. They also provide a framework for professional improvement; for example, the MAGD distinction requires 400 hours of participation-based CE as well as minimum credit requirements in 18 major subject areas. These requirements set a high standard for the quality as well as the well-rounded nature of the education received. These distinctions encourage members to maintain a high level of education long after their dental school graduations by regularly participating in CE courses and engaging with new knowledge that

can be applied in their practices for the benefit of their patients.

In addition to the standards FAGD and MAGD candidates are measured against, AGD also has rigorous standards for CE providers through its Program Approval for Continuing Education (PACE). The 13 standards/ criteria for approval by the PACE program include standards for administration, fiscal responsibility, learning objectives, evaluation, and self-instruction and electronically mediated programs, among others, and ensure PACE-approved CE providers develop programs in accordance to quality standards. PACE is overseen by AGD's PACE Council, and two of the purposes and goals of PACE are to improve the educational quality of continuing dental education programs and to promote uniformity of standards for continuing dental education that can be accepted by the dental profession. When choosing CE courses, clinicians can feel confident that PACE-approved providers have the organizational structure and resources necessary to provide CE activities of acceptable educational quality. The PACE standards serve the dental profession by setting a bar for continuing dental education, and this, when combined with the measurable distinctions provided by AGD, creates a quantifiable measurement for

The education you receive in dental school is only the beginning. professional excellence throughout a clinician's career with regard to lifelong learning and development.

Going Beyond

In addition to the FAGD and MAGD distinctions, AGD offers another measureable distinction: Lifelong Learning and Service Recognition (LLSR). LLSR requires an additional 500 CE credits—150 of which must be from participation-based course attendance-from at least eight of the major disciplines. LLSR also goes beyond CE by requiring the completion of 100 hours of dentalrelated community/volunteer service and/or service to organized dentistry. Acceptance of submitted service hours is subject to review by the Dental Education Council. Examples of recognized community and volunteer service include providing pro bono dental services through a not-forprofit organization, service in a volunteer dental clinic, service on a dental mission, and providing oral cancer screenings at a community location or event.

While the CE requirements of the FAGD, MAGD, and LLSR distinctions measure clinicians' dedication to continuously improving their skills and knowledge base in order to apply their improved education to patient care within their own practices, the service requirements of LLSR place an important voluntary standard on outward action. Many dentists prioritize volunteer service in an effort

to fill the gaps in oral health care access in their own communities as well as in regions around the globe where access to oral health care is limited. Despite the numerous modern advances in dental treatment for caries and periodontal disease, significant barriers to accessing care remain, and these barriers hinder the progress dental professionals can make toward addressing the oral health concerns of their communities. Providing pro bono services can bring care to patients who could otherwise not afford it, and it can make a phenomenal difference in their lives. The LLSR distinction represents a flagpost goal that encourages clinicians to participate in these activities and give back as a way to achieve a more fulfilling professional and personal life. And while fellowship and mastership status are one-time achievements, LLSR can be earned repeatedly. Some AGD members have earned LLSR as many as four and five times. These dedicated clinicians are an excellent example of the benefit of voluntary standards, both for the clinician as an individual and for the community as a greater whole.

In addition to voluntary clinical service, AGD members also propel the profession forward through activities related to organized dentistry. AGD has a strong advocacy arm that works to ensure the voices of general dentists are heard loud and clear within the state and national governments. Members unite to advocate on issues such as anesthesiology and sedation, barriers and access to care, Food and Drug Administration issues, and Medicare, as well as scientific and practice issues. Involvement in advocacy through organized dentistry enables members to directly impact the standards against which all members of the profession are measured.

Pursuing Excellence Together

Pursuing distinction and recognition from a professional organization like AGD mimics the benefits of dental school on a much larger scale and with more individual control. Other members become your professional colleagues, much like your classmates in dental school. AGD members receive support on their paths to fellowship, mastership, and LLSR from other members who are in the same place in their careers as well as from those who have already achieved these distinctions. Members who are on the track toward these distinctions share the goal of bettering themselves as clinicians, and this shared motivation can enable close personal bonds between colleagues. These bonds provide mutual support as well as inspiration to succeed.

Unlike during a clinician's • initial dental education, where the curriculum is packed and there is little room for deviation, CE allows clinicians to tailor their education to their professional needs and interests. While AGD mastership requires recipients to meet minimum CE credit requirements in all 18 major discipline areas in order to prove the general standard of excellence has been met, fellowship and LLSR both allow for a more open-ended approach to CE. Clinicians often serve patient populations with different needs, and those pursuing these distinctions can immerse themselves within the areas that will best serve their patients. Additionally, as clinicians consider adding new services to their treatment repertoire, they can pursue courses that meet their interests and learning objectives with the confidence provided by the PACE umbrella when choosing a CE provider.

It is important to emphasize that the CE credits AGD members pursue and the service hours they clock have far-reaching benefits. Keeping abreast of the latest in science and clinical practice translates directly into better care for patients. By pushing themselves to continuously learn new information and treatment methods, AGD members raise the bar for the dental profession to exceptional heights. By setting and meeting a higher standard for themselves, these clinicians set the standard for the profession. Staying current with the rapid pace of change and advancement in the dental industry as well as the latest recommended best practices is necessary in order to provide the highest level of care for patients, and the distinctions AGD confers encourage, recognize, and honor that commitment.

Conclusion

AGD commends the American College of Dentists for focusing on the broad issue of standards in dentistry and inviting AGD to participate. Dentistry is highly regulated, and each of the mandatory standards serves a specific purpose, which is often challenging to translate to the practicing dentist. Pursuing voluntary recognitions like FAGD, MAGD, and LLSR is about personal goal setting and lifelong learning and culminates with a sense of shared accomplishment. It is about setting a higher standard for yourself than what is required of you. The initials after my DDS also serve as a conversation

starter with patients, giving me the opportunity to tell them about my dedication to continuing my dental education as a lifelong learner and keeping up with the latest in science, technology, and techniques in order to better serve my patients. The pursuit of these voluntary standards is a way for me to differentiate myself from the status quo, and it is also a way for me to elevate my own skills beyond what is merely required and instead work to achieve my own maximum potential as a clinician. By pursuing these voluntary standards as AGD members, we elevate ourselves and each other, and in doing so, we also elevate the profession.





AGD Attends Two National Legislative Conferences

AGD leadership and staff exhibited at two national conferences in August — the annual National Conference of State Legislatures (NCSL) Legislative Summit and the American Legislative Exchange Council (ALEC) Annual Meeting — where state legislators from across the country discussed current legislative issues.

AGD government relations staff members were joined by AGD congressional liaison Mike Bromberg, DDS, at the NCSL Legislative Summit and Gordon R. Isbell III, DMD, MAGD, at the ALEC Annual Meeting to provide general information about AGD, speak with legislators about matters relating to oral health and general dentistry, and discuss specific issues legislators may have in their state and how AGD can be a partner to help solve them.

Both events are opportunities for legislators to gather and discuss state policy and potential solutions to

AGD, AAFP and AADE Developing Diabetes Toolkit

AGD is developing an online toolkit to help members access resources related to diabetes awareness and diagnosis. It includes a series of videos to educate members on when and how to perform a blood sugar (A1C) test on patients at risk for diabetes or prediabetes. The effort, supported by a Colgate educational grant, is the result of a partnership with AGD and the American Academy Family Physicians and the American Association of Diabetes Educators. AGD Foundation Hosts Interdisciplinary Oral Cancer Summit

On Aug. 16, the AGD Foundation hosted an Oral Cancer Summit at AGD headquarters in Chicago. The summit was facilitated by AGD Foundation Immediate Past President W. Mark Donald, DMD, MAGD, and included representatives from participating organizations in dentistry and medicine. The aim of the summit was to share information regarding the treatment and management of oral cancer patients from the perspective and knowledge base of each organization. Another goal is the development of a standardized interdisciplinary toolkit for dental and medical providers to use in oral cancer case management.

During the summit, each representative was given the opportunity to share current advances and obstacles facing their fields. Attendees brainstormed solutions to shared problems and volunteered to share information-based resources to fill gaps in each organization's capabilities. Throughout the day, the discussion focused on how to better serve and provide for patients through better interdisciplinary cooperation, optimized informationsharing, standardized timelines and protocols, and, above all, increased oral cancer awareness throughout the dental and medical professions.

The efforts of this group are ongoing, and AGD will continue to share updates and pertinent information with the general dentist community. The group will continue to meet in person or via teleconference, and representatives from other pertinent organizations will be added as they are identified. Attendees at the

Being the heart of AGD is more than a tagline — it's who we are and what we do. Following are highlights of the AGD Foundation's recent oral cancer awareness efforts to drive our mission.

Education for AGD Members

More than 1,000 AGD members registered for the May 2, 2019, free webinar, "Oral Cancer Screening." The webinar covered the basics of oral examination and focused on detection of clinically suspicious lesions. A flow chart–based algorithm helped clinicians assess suspicious intraoral white lesions. In addition, three onehour sessions on the topics of oral precancer, oral cancer and oropharyngeal cancer were presented at AGD2019 for dentists and their team members.



Screenings for the Public

In support of the AGD Foundation's mission to fight oral cancer, the AGD Foundation and the Connecticut AGD collaborated to host free public oral cancer screenings during AGD2019. Local dentists, hygienists and dental students screened 362 people.

Care Packages for Oral Cancer Survivors

The AGD Foundation was a sponsor of the AGD New Dentist Lounge at AGD2019. As a community service project, dental students assembled 200 care packages containing donated oral hygiene products specifically for oral cancer survivors at two local organizations, Hartford Hospital and Support for People with Oral and Head and Neck Cancer. The care packages also included notes of encouragement from the dental students.


